#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Three readings of Bylaw No. 008/20 – The Rules and Procedures for the Conduct of School Trustee Elections.

Reading #1: "That Bylaw No. 008/20 which relates to the rules and procedures for the conduct of School Trustee Election of The Board of Trustees of Elk Island Public Schools be given first reading." The first reading must be read in full, and then;

Reading #2: "That Bylaw No. 008/20 which relates to the rules and procedures for the conduct of School Trustee Election of The Board of Trustees of Elk Island Public Schools be given second reading." And, then if all trustees at the meeting are in unanimous agreement with Reading #1 and #2;

Reading #3: "That Bylaw No. 008/20 which relates to the rules and procedures for the conduct of School Trustee Election of The Board of Trustees of Elk Island Public Schools be given third reading."

That Bylaw No. 008/20 replaces Bylaws 002/95 and 006/17.



#### **BACKGROUND:**

Administration reviewed Bylaw No. 006/17 and proposes the following amendments:

- 1. An update to the corporate name from The Board of Trustees of Elk Island Public Schools Regional Division No. 14 to The Board of Trustees of Elk Island Public Schools (Ministerial Order #008/2020);
- 2. An update to reference the Education Act;
- 3. An update to reference new Bylaw No. 007/20;
- 4. An update to reference the receipt of nominations for trustee elections to be in accordance with the *Local Authorities Election Act*;
- 5. Technical amendments to add clarity;
- 6. Repeal Bylaw No. 002/95 as the *Local Authorities Election Act* sets out a new procedure relating to receipt of nominations; and
- 7. Repeal Bylaw No. 006/17 as it is much cleaner to approve a new bylaw than create amendments.

In accordance with the Board Procedures Regulation 82/2019, section 6, readings of bylaws:

- (1) Every bylaw of a board must have 3 distinct separate readings before the bylaw is passed.
- (2) Not more than 2 readings of a bylaw must be given at any one meeting unless the trustees present at the meeting unanimously agree to give the bylaw a 3rd reading.
- (3) The first reading of a bylaw must be read in full and, if each board member has in the member's possession a written, printed or electronic copy of the bylaw, the 2nd and 3rd readings may be in title and description only.

# A BYLAW OF THE THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF ELK ISLAND PUBLIC SCHOOLS REGIONAL DIVISION NO. 14

# TO ESTABLISH RULES AND PROCEDURES FOR THE CONDUCT OF SCHOOL TRUSTEE ELECTIONS.

WHEREAS the Board of Trustees of Elk Island Public Schools Regional Division No. 14 (the "Division") is a local jurisdiction for the purposes of the Local Authorities Election Act, RSA 2000, c. L-21 ("Local Authorities Election Act") established under the School Education Act, RSA 20002012, c. E-0.3 ("School Education Act");

AND WHEREAS Order in Council 579/94 established the GREATER ELK ISLAND REGIONAL DIVISION NO. 14; established a portion of the County of Minburn No. 27 as a ward of the Regional Division; specified the number of trustees to be elected to the Board of Trustees for each Ward; and specified the electoral subdivisions;

AND WHEREAS Order in Council 692/94 amended Order in Council 579/94 to change the name of the Greater Elk Island Regional Division No. 14 to the ELK ISLAND PUBLIC SCHOOLS REGIONAL DIVISION NO. 14 effective January 1, 1995;

AND WHEREAS The Minister of Education, by Ministerial Orders 164/94, 165/94, 166/94 and 167/94 realigned the boundaries of a number of public school districts located in the COUNTY OF MINBURN NO. 27 to have the named areas included in the portion of the County of Minburn No. 27 Ward in Elk Island Public Schools Regional Division No. 14;

AND WHEREAS Ministerial Order 034/2019 continued the Elk Island Public Schools Regional Division No. 14 as THE ELK ISLAND SCHOOL DIVISION and the Board of Trustees of Elk Island Public Schools Regional Division No. 14 as THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF ELK ISLAND SCHOOL DIVISION effective September 1, 2019.

AND WHEREAS Ministerial Order 008/2020 approved a change in the corporate name of the Board of Trustees of Elk Island School Division to THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF ELK ISLAND PUBLIC SCHOOLS effective January 21, 2020.

AND WHEREAS The Division now lies within the geographic boundaries of Strathcona County, County of Minburn, Lamont County and the City of Fort Saskatchewan;

AND WHEREAS The Division is governed by a Board of Trustees (the "Board") which is a corporate body established pursuant to the <u>School Education</u> Act;

AND WHEREAS on February 16, 2017 October 15, 2020, the Board approved By-law No. 0057/1720, by which it established the electoral subdivisions, wards and the number of trustees to be elected in each ward;

AND WHEREAS The Board has appointed its Returning Officer and <u>Substitute</u> <u>Returning Officer whothe Board's Returning Officer</u> will be responsible for the conduct of the election of Board trustees ("Trustee Elections");

AND WHEREAS Each of the following municipalities has <u>indicated an intention to</u> entered into agreements with the Board to provide services for the conduct of the Trustee Elections in conjunction with their own municipal elections: City of Fort Saskatchewan, County of Minburn, Lamont County, Strathcona County, Town of Bruderheim, Town of Lamont, Town of Mundare, Town of Vegreville, Village of Andrew, and Village of Chipman (the "Participating Municipalities");

AND WHEREAS each of the Participating Municipalities will conducts the Trustee Elections taking place within their respective boundaries in accordance with their Bbylaws governing the conduct of their respective municipal elections, and the agreements between the Board and each of the Participating Municipalities;

AND WHEREAS the Board has not previously passed a bylaw dealing with Trustee Elections;

NOW THEREFORE, the Board of Trustees of Elk Island Public Schools Regional Division No. 14, duly assembled, enacts the following:

#### 1. DEFINITIONS

1.1 THAT words in this bylaw are defined in the same manner as they are defined in the Local Authorities Election Act, the School Education Act, the Municipal Government Act and the respective election bylaws of the Participating Municipalities, as applicable.

#### 2. SCOPE

2.1 THAT this bylaw applies to the conduct of Board general elections and byelections conducted within the Participating Municipalities' boundaries.

#### 3. RETURNING OFFICER

3.1 THAT the Board's Returning Officer may do all things the Returning Officer deems necessary and appropriate for the conduct of the Trustee Elections, including, but not limited to, entering into agreements with the Participating Municipalities for any matter relating to the conduct of the Trustee Elections.

#### 4. NOMINATIONS

- 4.1 THAT Nominations for Trustee Elections will be taken by the Returning Officer or delegate at 683 Wye Road, Sherwood Park, Alberta, T8B 1N2.
- 4.2 THAT receipt of nominations for Trustee Elections will be in accordance with section 25 of the Local Authorities Election Act. the Board's Receipt of Nominations Bylaw, Bylaw 002/95, which provides that a Returning Officer may receive nominations between 9:00 a.m. and 12:00 noon on nomination day.

#### 5. VOTING PROCEDURES

- 5.1 THAT the Trustee Elections will be conducted in accordance with the election procedures prescribed by applicable enactments and the Participating Municipalities' election bylaws, and without limiting the preceding, the votes of Board electors may be taken:
  - a. by means of voting machines, vote recorders or automated voting systems, including the use of tabulators and express or electronic ballot marking options;
  - b. using machine readable ballots listing the names of candidates in alphabetical order; and
  - in accordance with each Participating Municipality's procedures for processing spoiled ballots, tabulator errors, ballot counting and recounts.

#### 6. SPECIAL VOTES

6.1 THAT advance votes, institutional votes, at-home votes, and special ballots (collectively, the "Special Votes"), as applicable, are approved for the Trustee Elections, with the procedure for Special Votes to follow the procedures prescribed by the Participating Municipalities' election bylaws, and as directed or designated by the Returning Officer conducting the municipal election for each of the Participating Municipalities.

#### 7. AGREEMENTS

7.1 THAT the Returning Officer is authorized to approve and enter into any agreement for the conduct of the Trustee Elections the Returning Officer deems necessary, subject to the Returning Officer's approved budget limits.

#### 8. VOTING STATIONS

8.1 THAT the voting stations for the Trustee Elections will be the same as the ones designated for the municipal elections in the Participating Municipalities.

#### 9. DISPOSITION OF ELECTION MATERIALS

9.1 THAT Trustee Election materials in the possession of the Participating Municipalities will be managed and destroyed in the same manner as the Participating Municipalities' election materials, in accordance with the requirements of the *Local Authorities Elections Act*.

#### 10. GENERAL

10.1 THAT if any matter required for the conduct of the Trustee Elections within the Participating Municipalities is not expressly provided for in this bylaw, the applicable provision of the election bylaw in the Participating

Municipality will govern, modified by the Returning Officer as required for the conduct of the Trustee Elections.

# A BYLAW OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF ELK ISLAND PUBLIC SCHOOLS TO ESTABLISH RULES AND PROCEDURES FOR THE CONDUCT OF SCHOOL TRUSTEE ELECTIONS

WHEREAS the Board of Trustees of Elk Island Public Schools (the "Division") is a local jurisdiction for the purposes of the *Local Authorities Election Act*, RSA 2000, c. L-21 ("Local Authorities Election Act") established under the *Education Act*, SA 2012, c. E-0.3 ("Education Act");

AND WHEREAS Order in Council 579/94 established the GREATER ELK ISLAND REGIONAL DIVISION NO. 14; established a portion of the County of Minburn No. 27 as a ward of the Regional Division; specified the number of trustees to be elected to the Board of Trustees for each Ward; and specified the electoral subdivisions;

AND WHEREAS Order in Council 692/94 amended Order in Council 579/94 to change the name of the Greater Elk Island Regional Division No. 14 to the ELK ISLAND PUBLIC SCHOOLS REGIONAL DIVISION NO. 14 effective January 1, 1995;

AND WHEREAS The Minister of Education, by Ministerial Orders 164/94, 165/94, 166/94 and 167/94 realigned the boundaries of a number of public school districts located in the COUNTY OF MINBURN NO. 27 to have the named areas included in the portion of the County of Minburn No. 27 Ward in Elk Island Public Schools Regional Division No. 14;

AND WHEREAS Ministerial Order 034/2019 continued the Elk Island Public Schools Regional Division No. 14 as THE ELK ISLAND SCHOOL DIVISION and the Board of Trustees of Elk Island Public Schools Regional Division No. 14 as THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF ELK ISLAND SCHOOL DIVISION effective September 1, 2019.

AND WHEREAS Ministerial Order 008/2020 approved a change in the corporate name of the Board of Trustees of Elk Island School Division to THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF ELK ISLAND PUBLIC SCHOOLS effective January 21, 2020.

AND WHEREAS The Division now lies within the geographic boundaries of Strathcona County, County of Minburn, Lamont County and the City of Fort Saskatchewan;

AND WHEREAS The Division is governed by a Board of Trustees (the "Board") which is a corporate body established pursuant to the *Education Act*;

AND WHEREAS on October 15, 2020, the Board approved Bylaw No. 007/20, by which it established the electoral subdivisions, wards and the number of trustees to be elected in each ward;

AND WHEREAS The Board has appointed its Returning Officer and Substitute

Returning Officer who will be responsible for the conduct of the election of Board trustees ("Trustee Elections");

AND WHEREAS Each of the following municipalities has indicated an intention to enter into agreements with the Board to provide services for the conduct of the Trustee Elections in conjunction with their own municipal elections: City of Fort Saskatchewan, County of Minburn, Lamont County, Strathcona County, Town of Bruderheim, Town of Lamont, Town of Mundare, Town of Vegreville, Village of Andrew, and Village of Chipman (the "Participating Municipalities");

AND WHEREAS each of the Participating Municipalities will conduct the Trustee Elections taking place within their respective boundaries in accordance with their bylaws governing the conduct of their respective municipal elections, and the agreements between the Board and each of the Participating Municipalities;

NOW THEREFORE, the Board of Trustees of Elk Island Public Schools, duly assembled, enacts the following:

#### 1. DEFINITIONS

1.1 THAT words in this bylaw are defined in the same manner as they are defined in the Local Authorities Election Act, the Education Act, the Municipal Government Act and the respective election bylaws of the Participating Municipalities, as applicable.

#### 2. SCOPE

2.1 THAT this bylaw applies to the conduct of Board general elections and byelections conducted within the Participating Municipalities' boundaries.

#### 3. RETURNING OFFICER

3.1 THAT the Board's Returning Officer may do all things the Returning Officer deems necessary and appropriate for the conduct of the Trustee Elections, including, but not limited to, entering into agreements with the Participating Municipalities for any matter relating to the conduct of the Trustee Elections.

#### 4. NOMINATIONS

- 4.1 THAT Nominations for Trustee Elections will be taken by the Returning Officer or delegate at 683 Wye Road, Sherwood Park, Alberta, T8B 1N2.
- 4.2 THAT receipt of nominations for Trustee Elections will be in accordance with section 25 of the *Local Authorities Election Act*.

#### 5. VOTING PROCEDURES

- 5.1 THAT the Trustee Elections will be conducted in accordance with the election procedures prescribed by applicable enactments and the Participating Municipalities' election bylaws, and without limiting the preceding, the votes of Board electors may be taken:
  - a. by means of voting machines, vote recorders or automated voting systems, including the use of tabulators and express or electronic ballot marking options;
  - b. using machine readable ballots listing the names of candidates in alphabetical order; and
  - in accordance with each Participating Municipality's procedures for processing spoiled ballots, tabulator errors, ballot counting and recounts.

#### 6. SPECIAL VOTES

6.1 THAT advance votes, institutional votes, at-home votes, and special ballots (collectively, the "Special Votes"), as applicable, are approved for the Trustee Elections, with the procedure for Special Votes to follow the procedures prescribed by the Participating Municipalities' election bylaws, and as directed or designated by the Returning Officer conducting the municipal election for each of the Participating Municipalities.

#### 7. AGREEMENTS

7.1 THAT the Returning Officer is authorized to approve and enter into any agreement for the conduct of the Trustee Elections the Returning Officer deems necessary, subject to the Returning Officer's approved budget limits.

#### 8. VOTING STATIONS

8.1 THAT the voting stations for the Trustee Elections will be the same as the ones designated for the municipal elections in the Participating Municipalities.

#### 9. DISPOSITION OF ELECTION MATERIALS

9.1 THAT Trustee Election materials in the possession of the Participating Municipalities will be managed and destroyed in the same manner as the Participating Municipalities' election materials, in accordance with the requirements of the *Local Authorities Elections Act*.

#### 10. GENERAL

10.1 THAT if any matter required for the conduct of the Trustee Elections within the Participating Municipalities is not expressly provided for in this bylaw, the applicable provision of the election bylaw in the Participating

Municipality will govern, modified by the Returning Officer as required for the conduct of the Trustee Elections.

UPON third reading of Bylaw No. 008/20, Bylaw No. 002/95 and Bylaw No. 006/17 are hereby repealed.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

That the Board direct administration to establish a Junior High Honours System Program for the 2021-22 school year, modelled after the Junior High Honours pilot project and offered at Sherwood Heights, F.R. Haythorne and Ardrossan Junior/Senior in grades 8 and 9.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

The Junior High Honours Program, when it was first established, was described as follows:

- Designed for students who do well in their courses and who enjoy challenging learning and academic environments.
- Students with an academic average of 80% or higher in the four core subjects are considered eligible to apply for the Honours program.
- Students follow the Alberta Education Programs of Study and assessment is based on Alberta Education learning outcomes.

Over the past few years, junior high honours programming has been an ongoing discussion at Elk Island Public Schools (EIPS). Junior high principals have engaged in discussions regarding the program and in what format it should be offered. At a November 2018 Leadership meeting, the majority of principals in the Division felt the current offering of the Junior High Honours Program was an organizational grouping where higher achieving students were clustered together for core classes. Feedback provided by principals at this meeting included the



#### following:

- There was little consensus among principals about the value of offering honours programming for students.
- The Honours program did not have any features that differed from what was being covered in the regular classroom.
- For a number of principals, pulling together all the high achieving students into one learning group felt like "streaming" and there was a philosophical belief in the benefit of an inclusive learning environment that ensured all students are provided access to meaningful, relevant and challenging learning experiences in the regular classroom.
- Additionally, pulling together all the high achieving students into one learning group did not provide for academic role models in the regular classes.
- There is not equity of access to Honours programs even within larger urban settings (i.e., Fort Saskatchewan and Strathcona County including Sherwood Park).
- Concerns regarding the integrity of the selection process were cited as entrance into the Junior High Honours Program sometimes came down to differentiating grade averages that differ by two decimal places, which is difficult to assess or quantify by staff. As a result, selection of students into the Honours program was not felt to be equitable. As such, over the past several years, the schools that offer the Honours program have transitioned to offering Honours in only grade 8 and 9, eliminating grade 7 Honours classes. This is largely due to the fact that principals felt it was very challenging making decisions regarding which students would be accepted into an Honours program. Waiting one more year allowed them better insight into who would be most successful in this program.
- Principals felt there should be more comprehensive entrance standards that are common across schools and common expectations for the Honours programs should also be established to ensure instructional rigour.

This feedback was shared with the Board of Trustees and based on the high demand for the Junior High Honours Program among the parent community (see the five-year enrollment trend data below), the Board was in favour of the Junior High Honours Program being reconceptualized.

As a result of the demand for the program, the Division began work to create a pilot project that addressed principals' concerns - ensuring consistency in the Honours program across the Division, introducing academic rigour that would be common at the Honours sites and establishing common entrance requirements.

It was determined that because the curriculum is consistent across the sites, introducing instructional practices, such as project-based learning, was one way to incorporate unique and rigorous elements into an Honours program. The plan included developing two cross curriculum projects per grade (one Humanities and one STEM project) that would be completed by every Honours student. A summary of the work to prepare teachers to implement the new program included the following:

- A full day professional learning session, to build teacher capacity in the area of project-based learning occurred on April 8, 2019 for all Junior High Honours teachers.
- The creation of a working group of Honours teachers to develop two grade 8 and 9 cross-curricular projects (one Humanities and one STEM).
- Common entrance requirements were developed, which included a combination of mark and teacher rating scales.
- Common messaging for the Honours program was developed for communication with parents, students, teachers and schools and sent out prior to the end of April 2019.
- On May 30, 2019 (Humanities) and June 3 (STEM) Supports for Students met with Junior High Honours Project-Based Learning (PBL) planning groups. The goals for the days were to share existing projects, decide on a PBL for grade 8 and 9 in both the Humanities and STEM areas, connect those project ideas to curricular outcomes, decide on what students would create and how they would share their work publicly. It was determined that the projects would be:
  - Grade 8 Humanities: What is a warrior and how have they changed their world?
  - o Grade 9 Humanities: What is your role in nurturing our planet?
  - Grade 8 STEM: Identify a practical problem and create and market a solution that will improve quality of life.
  - Grade 9 STEM: How would a sustainable colony in space operate?



- Dates and times for the Junior High Honours working groups were established throughout the remainder
  of the year to develop the projects and common assessment. Implementation and completion of the
  projects were agreed to be for the 2019-20 school year.
- Expectations were put in place that those schools not offering the Junior High Honours Program would be
  required to offer challenge opportunities for students. Principals were asked to examine the existing CTF
  courses they were offering to ensure there were appropriate levels of challenge throughout these
  courses. A sharing folder with a list of challenge CTF activities was developed by SFS to support teachers in
  providing higher level learning for high achieving students.
- Additionally, to build capacity in appropriately challenging all students to achieve at their highest level, Shelley Moore, an inclusive learning author and presenter worked with junior high teachers regarding how to differentiate programming in the regular classroom. Fifty-seven junior high teachers took part in this series.
- To further support the pedagogical shift with project-based learning, additional training sessions were held for junior high Honours teachers on October 29th and 30th, 2019 and SFS followed up with principals implementing the Junior High Honours Program to ensure they were adhering to the new program requirements.
- Additionally, Junior High Honours teachers were involved in monthly check-in meetings. Most of the
  teachers were planning to finish the coverage of their curriculum outcomes and begin their projects in
  May as a cumulative assessment. The consultant also reached out to discuss how to support teachers with
  project-based learning in an alternative learning environment.
- In March 2020, when the province cancelled all in school classes because of the global COVID-19 pandemic, the STEM and Humanities projects were not able to be completed.

To further enhance the Board's decision making regarding the status of the Junior High Honours Program, the Board requested that administration conduct a review of the Junior High Honours Program offered throughout the Division. The goal of this review was to gather feedback that would help the Division make decisions on how best to meet the needs of high-achieving students. One component of the review was an online survey designed to gather input on the learning needs of junior high honours students, collect feedback on the current Junior High Honours Program and gather input on alternative approaches that could be used for the Junior High Honours Program. The Division sent out a survey on Oct. 14, 2020 for input from all families with students in grades 5-9 — regardless of whether or not their child is currently enrolled in the Junior High Honours Program. Input was collected from all current junior high families, as well as those with children who will be moving into junior high in the next few years. The results of this survey have been used by the Board to gauge the desire for potential alternatives for a Junior High Honours Program modelled after successful programs already in place, or remaining with the status quo and were also used as a basis for the Board directing administration to bring forward a recommendation. A summary of the feedback is provided below:

- While 1,410 parents began the survey, not all completed all of the questions. In looking at the data there was a fairly equal distribution of responses based on the enrolment grade of the respondents' child.
- Of the total number of respondents, 90.7% (1,279) reported that they do not have a child currently enrolled in the Junior High Honours Program and 9.3% (131) indicated that they currently had a child enrolled in the Junior High Honours program. It is important to note that the 131 respondents do not align with the 96 students that the Division currently has registered in the program. This would suggest that in some instances, either two parents responded from a family, or some parents thought their child is in the Honours program because they are an honours student.



- In the chart below and following pages, data are reported in the first column for ALL respondents and the second column reflects only the responses for those who indicated they had a child currently enrolled in the Honours program.
- The full survey results, along with the quantitative comments are included in the attachments for Trustees to gain a more robust and holistic perspective.

At a high level the following key points are highlighted from the parent survey to assist Trustees in their decision making. It is noted that these are summary statements, and it is recommended that all comments in Attachments 1 and 2 be considered to get a holistic perspective of the feedback, prior to voting on the recommendation.

- The top benefits of the Honours program that were highlighted by respondents are that students
  are provided challenge by being grouped with like-minded students which reduces boredom and
  mitigates frustration with the slower pace of a regular class. This type of programming increases
  motivation.
- The top challenges of the Honours program that were highlighted by respondents are that higher expectations associated with an Honours program can lead to anxiety, stress, pressure and competition and the divisive nature of separating peer groups can create socialization and/or exclusion concerns.
- The majority of all respondents (53.8%) would not enrol their child in a Junior High Honours Program if it was offered in a single junior high school in the Division.
- 54.6% of respondents would pay an associated fee.
- 68.4% agreed with having standardized and rigorous entrance criteria.
- The majority of all respondents, as noted through their comments, were most in favour of offering the same curriculum as in the regular classroom but with the added opportunities for enriched learning activities such as projects, additional topics, more in depth, etc. Some suggested at a faster pace.
- Only 6.5% of all respondents strongly agreed that the Junior High Honours Program should



only be available for gifted students with high IQs.

#### **CONSIDERATION AND ANALYSIS:**

- Not all principals are in agreement with the benefits of a Junior High Honours Program, however there is a high demand from the Junior High Honours parents to continue the Program.
- The majority of parents would like the Junior High Honours Program to remain as it currently is being offered using the current Alberta Program of Studies, project-based and standardized rigorous entrance requirements.
- Using the current curriculum would not qualify the Junior High Honours Program as an Alternative program in the Division. As such, If the Board wants to ensure that the Junior High Honours Program remains in the Division, it would need to be established as a Division System Program.
- If the program is not a Division System Program that is established by the Board, principals would most likely discontinue this being offered in their schools.
- With only 55% of parents reporting that they would pay a fee for their child to attend the Junior High Honours program, if the recommendation is approved, there would be no system program fee for the Junior High Honours program.
- With only 54% of parents reporting that they would not enrol their child in the Junior High Honours Program if it were offered in only one school in the Division, three school sites have been proposed to offer the program.
- Currently the Junior High Honours Program is being offered at Ardrossan Junior/Senior, F.R. Haythorne and Sherwood Heights.
- It is being proposed that for the 2021-22 school year that the Program remain at these same locations until the demand for the Program is established and school utilization rates in Sherwood Park can be explored if expansion is required.
- For those requiring transportation to attend the Junior High Honours program, fees would be applicable as per the Transportation flow chart posted on the eips.ca website.


#### **COMMUNICATION PLAN**







# Q2 What grade is your child in? If you have more than one child in grades 5-9, check all that apply.






# Q3 Do you have a child currently enrolled in the junior high Honours program?

It also helps with the advancement of educational practices, as often these students show teachers how to be better educators and improve their own practices, that may be outdated or limiting to the 21st century student. This can not be accomplished for these students in a traditional classroom, as the teacher is too busy dealing with teaching to the middle or low learner and dealing with behavior issues and often those who have the creative ideas are not given opportunities to excel. Discipline issues and grouping strong learners to help raise weak learners in group settings also hinder this process, as the best students are forced to help the weaker in the group rather than utilizing their talents to advance their own learning. We see evidence of changes in motivation and self efficacy as these students move into high school and now are grouped into IB and AP classes. They excel, begin to feel more part of the learning process, gain more acceptance from peers and begin to challenge the system and each other to grow and compete for better understanding of problems beyond the simple established norms. 



# Q8 Would you enrol your child in a junior high Honours program if it was offered in a single junior high school in the Division?











## Q2 What grade is your child in? If you have more than one child in grades 5-9, check all that apply.






## Q3 Do you have a child currently enrolled in the junior high Honours program?



# Q8 Would you enrol your child in a junior high Honours program if it was offered in a single junior high school in the Division?









#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

That the Board of Trustees accept the recommendation that the administration of grades 6 and 9 Provincial Achievement Tests be suspended for the 2020-21 school year.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

In July of 2020, the province announced the provincial re-entry plan with the intended outcome of students returning to in person classes in the Fall of 2020 in Scenario 1 (near normal conditions with added health measures). In August of 2020, EIPS released its detailed re-entry plan to address the return to school for students and staff and this plan has been fully implemented.

Despite the Division's best efforts, the pandemic has had significant effects on staff, students, and families — resulting in considerable disruption to learning to date. Since the beginning of the school year, many of the Division's schools have been impacted by cases of COVID-19. As of November 30, 2020 - 2,348 students and 198 staff have been required to self-isolate for periods of up to 14 days at a time. This has had significant impact on the continuity of teaching and learning. With rising rates of infection in the province and no relief currently in sight, there is little to suggest that interruptions to learning will ease during the 2020-21 school year.

From an operational perspective, the 2020-21 school year has been far from 'near normal' as suggested in Scenario 1. As such, the following have been identified as issues relative to participation in the Provincial Achievement Tests (PATs):

• The impact of COVID-19 has proven to be stressful for many staff and students. Due to the changes in routines, heightened protocols, movement from in class to on-line learning and changes to some Junior



## **RECOMMENDATION REPORT**

Highs moving to a quarter schedule, additional anxiety and uncertainty has been created. For many, the added pressure of the administration of PAT exams is contributing to teacher and student stress;

- Missing instructional time may have significant effect on student performance and achievement and thus
  the usefulness of PAT data for decision-making and comparative purposes may be limited;
- Continuity of instruction has been affected by teacher illness and absence which in turn has impacted the quality of instruction resulting in a question regarding the validity of PAT results this year;
- The effect of on-line learning on student achievement is still yet to be determined and the practicality of conducting in-person PATs for these on-line learners, who often are medically compromised, may not be feasible;
- Inequity in access to on-line resources as well as technology barriers has impacted some of our students creating greater stress for them and their families; and
- It is also anticipated that students requiring specialized supports and services may have experienced inequities as a result of the many changes experienced shifting from in school to on-line learning, limiting their access to instruction and specialized supports they require.

As such, in doing a cost/benefit analysis - when the Division weighs the stress of preparing for PATS, the impact of COVID-19 on mental health and well-being, the frequent changes from in school to on-line learning, the impact on continuity of instruction, the change for some schools moving to a quarter schedule, the inequities in opportunity to learn and the apparent lack of validity of the results impacting the ability to reliably compare trend data, it is recommended that the PAT tests be suspended for the 2020-21 school year.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

Bullying Awareness and Prevention Week is an annual event to promote awareness and understanding of bullying and its consequences in the school community.

It's students, families and divisions' resposibility to ensure schools offer welcoming, safe, caring and respectful environments to both students and staff. In accordance with Section 35 of the *Education Act*, schools recognize Bullying Awareness and Prevention Week during the third week of November each year.

#### **CURRENT INFORMATION OR KEY POINT:**

- Elk Island Public Schools staff, students, families and community partners all have a role in creating and maintaining welcoming, caring, respectful and safe learning environments in schools.
- Awareness and adult intervention are keys to bullying prevention.
- Efforts to create welcoming, caring, respectful and safe school environments are ongoing at schools divisionwide. Participating n Bullying Awareness and Prevention Week complements this effort as it brings attention to the importance of positive and healthy relationships in schools and communities.

- How does being treated disrespectfully by an adult perpetuate the bullying? Such as "I can't lash out at that adult, so without realizing it, I take my pain out on my peers around me.
- What can you do if you know that you are the one that can be hurtful in the way that you speak or act toward others? Such as, Give people permission to say something when you've gone too far or check yourself for acting on an impulse.

# Monday-Friday:

Videos and discussion questions for morning devotions this week. Each of the videos were short in length and designed to create discussion in class. There were separate junior high and senior high videos and questions.

#### ISSUE:

That the Board of Trustees receive for information the Unaudited Financial Report for the period Sept. 1, 2020 to Nov. 30, 2020 for Elk Island Public Schools.

# **BACKGROUND:**

Policy 2: Role of the Board, Section 8, Fiscal Accountability, establishes that the Board of Trustees will monitor the fiscal management of EIPS through receipt of quarterly variance analysis.

### **CURRENT SITUATION OR KEY POINT:**

Financial Services has prepared an unaudited financial report for the three-month period ended Nov. 30, 2020. This report has format changes from prior year, with the goal of optimizing use of our new enterprise resource planning software, and also providing the Board with additional clarity and transparency on Division results. Changes include:

- Reporting revenue and expense variances based on expected year to date % spent, rather than establishing a
  unique YTD budget for each budget center.
- New reporting on capital projects.
- Slightly reduced reporting on investments, as balances have fallen significantly over the past two years.
- Revised reporting for board and system administrative expenses.

This report compares current results to the fall budget. In general, schools are expected to be about 30% spent at this point in the year (3/10<sup>ths</sup> of the school year complete), while central department costs and Division revenue are expected to be about 25% spent (4/12<sup>ths</sup> of the fiscal year complete). For schools and revenue variances, notes are provided for variances exceeding five per cent of budget. For central services, notes are provided for every budget group.



Please note the majority of variances are typically the result of timing differences, meaning expenditures are not incurred evenly over the course of the year. These timing differences are expected to resolve themselves (variances will be eliminated) by the end of the school year when all expenses will have been incurred.

Some other variances are what we would consider a 'permanent' variance and are not expected to resolve themselves by the end of the year. These variances would contribute to any difference between our fall budget and our actual year-end results.

As of Nov. 30, 2020, EIPS has an overall operating surplus of \$3,239,000. Revenue and expense variances are detailed in the First Quarter Report 2020-21.


#### **COVID-19 Pandemic**

COVID-19 has had a significant impact on the Division and continues to bring new challenges. In September 2020, the Government of Canada announced "Safe Return to Class" grant funding of which EIPS will receive \$6.12 million. Using this funding, along with insurance premium savings, the balances remaining in To Be Allocated from the Spring, and the remaining unallocated reserves that were approved for usage by the Minister, EIPS was able to make additional allocations to schools and departments to support COVID-related changes in activities, and cover additional COVID-related costs such as funds to support out-of-school learners, increased custodial cleaning costs, personal protective equipment, additional cleaning for buses, and additional projected spending on substitutes due to illness.

# **Revised Funding Model**

The new Alberta Education funding model was implemented in September 2020. As such, EIPS funding is now allocated and reported in the new categories including Base Instruction, Services & Supports, School - System Needs, Community, and Jurisdiction.

**Board and System Administration** current expenses are at \$0.97 million, or 2.1% of total expenses for EIPS. This means the Division has spent 16% of the Board and System Administration grant provided by Alberta Education, and 22% of total Board and System Administration budget for EIPS.




# Revenue & Expense Analysis (excluding SGF) For The Three Month Period Ended November 30, 2020

# **Revenues by Source**





# **Alberta Education Revenues**





# Elk Island Public Schools Revenue Notes For the Three Month Period Ended November 30, 2020

#### A. Alberta Education - Other

Revenue is 7% higher than expected at this point in the year.

This is primarily a result of two timing differences that will be addressed by the end of the year.

- Secondment revenue is billed over 10 months, rather than 12 months.
- This line includes revenue recorded for the donated COVID-19 supplies provided by the province, which was fully recognized at the end of the first quarter.

### B. Alberta Education – Supported Amortization

Revenue is 11% lower than expected at this point in the year.

Revenue for supported amortization will increase over the remaining months of the year as capital maintenance projects are completed and begin amortization.

#### C. Other Alberta School Authorities

Revenue is 6% higher than expected at this point in the year.

This is a result of timing differences as revenue received for the Low Incidence Team is recognized evenly over the school year (10 months) rather than over 12 months.

# D. Fees

Revenue for fees is 62% higher than expected at this point in the year.

This line only includes transportation fees, which are recorded as received. As these were billed prior to the start of the school year (are not being billed quarterly), most of the revenue for the year has already been recognized.

There are a small amount of payment plan fees to be collected over the next quarter, but the remainder of this variance is likely to be a permanent variance at the end of the year. EIPS Transportation department has adjusted spending to account for this reduction.

# E. Other Sales and Services

Revenue is 6% below where expected at this point in the year.

The Division receives a rebate annually based on Division-wide purchases made on purchase card. This rebate is expected to be received in the spring, making this a timing difference.

# F. Investment Income

Investment income is 11% higher than expected at this point in the year.

This is due to the timing of investment maturities for the Division. Monthly investment income will decrease over the remaining quarters of the year as investments mature and are not necessarily reinvested.

# G. Rental of Facilities

Revenue is 6% higher than expected at this point in the year due to a timing difference.

The balance in this revenue line is primarily rental revenue for before and after school care groups operating in our facilities, which is recorded over the ten-month school year, not through the summer months, so we would expect to see revenue closer to 30% at this point in the year.





# Elk Island Public Schools Expense Notes – Schools For the Three Month Period Ended November 30, 2020

# A. Supports for Students (Schools) - Early Learning

Expenses are below expected year to date spending by 7%.

- The Division's PALS programs have been accepting students up until November 30th due to additional time for registration provided by Alberta Education. This means that some allocations are being made later than normal to address classroom needs in these programs. Also, spending related to specialized equipment in some of these classrooms has been delayed for similar reasons.
- Supports for Students continues to work with schools to identify early learning needs and allocate
  additional supports to schools. The department is also are aware that some students in out of school
  early learning programming may return to school, and are ensuring that appropriate support can be
  provided to schools should scenarios change.
- Funds set aside for Enhanced Kindergarten will be spent in the remaining quarters of the year, resulting in a timing difference.

# B. Supports for Students (Schools) - Out of School Learning K-9

Expenses are below expected year to date spending by 11%.

- Staffing expenditures in this department are being recorded at actual costs, rather than standard costs. As a result, a timing difference is created as most expenses will be over 12 months (25% spent by end of first quarter) rather than over 10 months.
- Hiring for Out of School Learning positions has been staggered throughout the first quarter also causing some of this variance.
- In addition, some funding has been set aside for future staffing requirements for any additional students enrolling in the program. These discrepancies should diminish into the second and third quarter.

# C. Supports for Students (Schools) – Specialized Supports & Other Programs

Expenses are below expected year to date spending by 11%.

- It is anticipated that spending will increase in the remaining quarters of the year as schools are continuing to make requests for additional support for complex student needs.
- Some costs have been temporarily reduced due to out-of-school learning and increasing virtual consultation due to COVID-19.
- Also, with many students in out-of-school learning, schools have been able to redeploy staff to support emerging needs; if a scenario change occurs, these students will be supported with additional staffing and specialized equipment.

## D. Other - New School Building Start Up (Heritage Hills)

Expenses are below expected year to date spending by 15%.

• These expenses reflect school opening costs not covered by Provincial capital funding. Expenses are expected to be incurred over the remaining months of the year.

# E. Other - Leveraging Student Achievement

Expenses are below expected year to date spending by 30%.

• This budget line was not approved by Board until November 26, so spending has not yet begun. These funds are expected to be allocated out to schools over the remaining quarters of the year.

#### F. Other - Other School Allocations

The variance relates to the accrual of salaries to the end of November. When salaries are paid in December the individual schools will be charged and the accrual cleared to zero.

#### G. Other - To Be Allocated

As per the Fall Budget Update approved by the Board in November, \$4.4 million has been set aside to be allocated as required to meet school needs. This includes:

- \$3.9 million for staffing and substitute support (illness)
- \$79,000 for Outreach
- \$18,000 for miscellaneous costs
- \$425,000 remaining available to be allocated.

# H. Other – Conversion (10 mo. To 12 mo.)

This budget converts certificated salaries from a 12 month basis (as paid) to a 10 month basis (as earned), and will even out to zero by the end of the fourth quarter.

#### I. Other – Standard Cost Conversion

This is comprised of the net conversion between standard costs charged to schools and actual salaries and benefits for school employees. Based on historical results, this surplus will lower throughout the year as salaries stabilize.

# Elk Island Public Schools Expense Notes – Central Services For the Three Month Period Ended November 30, 2020

#### A. Governance

Includes the Board of Trustees budget.

Expenses are below expected year to date spending by 1%.

- This budget does not follow a uniformed spending pattern. Typically, the Board has expended some
  of the professional development (PD) dollars for the Alberta School Board Association Fall General
  Meeting, but it was held virtually and there were not the expenses typically incurred. This might
  continue to be the case for the remainder of the year as the Board is unlikely to congregate in large
  numbers for the unforeseen future.
- Most of Trustees' discretionary funds is usually tied up in PD. This also includes Alberta School
  Councils' Association conference which the Board usually sets \$5,000 dollars aside to sponsor school
  councils. It is unlikely that the Board will be expending those dollars. These funds maybe repurpose
  as more information becomes known.

#### B. Education Executive

Includes the Superintendent, Communications, and Election budgets.

Expenses are below expected year to date spending by 5%.

- Expenses in the Communications department and Division Principal program are tracking closely to expected spending at this point in the year.
- There are a number of timing differences in the Superintendent department. There is below expected spending in the Planning and Leadership Workshop programs, as activities in these programs are planned for later in the year. There has also been little to no spend in contracted service and supplies to date, however it is anticipated this will be fully spent in the remaining quarters of the year. Savings in salary have resulted from delaying the recruitment for a vacant position as management is reviewing the effects of the workload brought on by this change, as well as COVID-19.

## C. Supports for Students – Central

Includes Associate Superintendent, Instructional Supports, and Central Specialized Supports budgets.

Expenses are below expected year to date spending by 5%. However, this is consistent with prior year.

- Associate Superintendent expenses are below year to date spending resulting from COVID-19
  restrictions limiting school and in person visits. This has resulted in the First Nations Métis Inuit
  program expense, mileage, professional development, and contracted services being underspent in
  the first quarter.
- The Instructional Supports budget is underspent for mileage, contracted services, and professional development in the first quarter primarily related to the COVID-19 restrictions. There is timing differences in expenditures for the Dual Credit and Career and Technology Foundations programs which should be incurred in the second or third quarter of the year.
- Central Specialized Supports expenses are tracking as expected.

#### D. Human Resources

Includes Associate Superintendent, Staff Relations and Training, and Recruitment and Staffing budgets.

Expenses are below expected year to date spending by 3%.

- Associate Superintendent expenses for the Enterprise Resource Planning Software Project and Long Service programs will be reported in future months. Severance expenses are also included in the Associate Superintendent budget and do not follow a uniform spending pattern throughout the year.
- Staff Relations & Training expenses for Off to a Good Start and the Health Recovery programs are
  reporting very little expense in the first quarter, however it is anticipated this will be incurred in
  future quarters. In addition, Professional Development has shifted to primarily virtual platforms due
  to COVID-19, which could impact the PD costs and the number of registrations. Management is
  currently monitoring these expenditures to identify trends.
- Recruitment & Staffing expenses are tracking as expected.

#### E. Business Services

Includes the Secretary-Treasurer and Financial Services budgets.

Expenses are below expected year to date spending by 5%.

- Financial Services is underspent primarily due to a timing difference resulting from the mid-year transfer of a budget program from another department, which will resolve itself by the end of the year. It also relates to contracted services for internal audits (which will mostly be incurred in the second and third guarter) and the external audit (which will be incurred in the fourth guarter).
- Secretary-Treasurer expenses are underspent in both insurance and legal programs. For insurance,
  EIPS is still awaiting some final numbers and can then determine if there will be a permanent variance
  in this expenditure line. Legal expenses are not predictable and could be incurred at any point in the
  future.

### F. Facility Services

Includes the Facility Services and Infrastructure Maintenance and Renewal budgets.

Expenses are below expected year to date spending by 6%. Rather than a single program, this is a result of several variances, some of which are offsetting.

- Within the Facility Services budget, the primary variance is related to the Wye Elementary demolition
  and abatement. The demolition is currently underway, and Facilities is waiting for final invoicing. It is
  anticipated this will be under budget and surplus funds will be returned to the province.
- In addition, expenditures for contracted services for the central building and custodial programs are trending below expected, however these are not evenly incurred throughout the year. Summer months tend to report higher expenditures in these budgets.
- The insurance program is currently trending slightly overspent, but this is due to timing difference in insurance. Insurance premiums for September and October were from our prior insurance provider and were significantly higher than what EIPS expects for November onward (new provider).
- Utility charges are currently trending under budget and not evenly distributed throughout the year, as the second and third quarters tend to be higher.
- Infrastructure Maintenance and Renewal expenses do not follow a uniform spending pattern as
  projects at schools are scheduled at different times throughout the year. The expense variance is
  offset by an equal variance in revenue (within the Schools System Needs grant), resulting in no
  impact to the bottom line.

### G. Information Technologies

Includes the Information Technologies budget.

Expenses are below expected year to date spending by 2%.

- The primary variance is within salaries and relates to timing in the hiring of vacant positions within the department.
- The other significant variance is within software and cloud computing budgets; however, this is common as they are not evenly distributed throughout the year and it is anticipated it will be fully spent by the fourth quarter.

# H. Student Transportation

Includes the Student Transportation budget.

Expenses are above expected year to date spending by 1%.

- Contracted transportation expenses are incurred over the school year (rather than 12 months), which creates a timing variance.
- This is slightly offset by timing differences in insurance and other expenditures.

#### I. Fiscal Services


Includes the Fiscal Capital and Fiscal Operations budget.

Expenses are above expected year to date spending by 2%.

• This variance is primarily related to the accrual of salaries to the end of November. When salaries are paid in December the individual departments will be charged and the accruals cleared.

Cash and investment balances are expected to fall over the 2020-21 year as the Division has planned a \$4.7 million budget deficit. In addition, the Division is planning conservatively for cash flow, in order to maintain as much flexibility as possible in the scenario that the Division has to unexpectedly shift to different learning formats for students, or that other COVID-related costs increase more than projected.

Trust balances have significantly decreased from prior year as the provincial RCSD program was eliminated.
