BACKGROUND:

The Board is responsible for developing, approving and monitoring the implementation of policies to guide the Division, and to provide direction in those areas over which the Board wishes to retain authority.

As per Board Policy 10: Policy Making, the Policy Committee receives feedback/information from trustees/administration/stakeholders and develops policy positions as directed by the Board. Policies are reviewed annually and the Policy Committee provides recommendations to the Board on required additions, amendments and deletions.

For section 1.3.7. we amended the language to Assurance Framework Review but have learned that Alberta Education will not be changing the name from Annual Education Results Report, so this naming will need to stay in the Policy.

COMMUNICATION PLAN:

Once approved, the Board Policies and Administrative Procedures will be updated on the website and StaffConnect, and stakeholders will be advised.

Policy 2

ROLE OF THE BOARD

As an elected corporate body which governs Elk Island Public Schools, the Board of Trustees shall provide overall direction and leadership to the Division and is accountable for the provision of appropriate educational services and programs to resident students within the Division, in keeping with the requirements of government legislation and the values of the electorate.

1. Specific areas of responsibility

- 1.1. Accountability to provincial government
 - 1.1.1. Act in accordance with all statutory requirements to implement provincial and educational standards and policies.
 - 1.1.2. Perform Board functions required by governing legislation and existing Board policy.
- 1.2. Accountability to community
 - 1.2.1. Make informed decisions that consider community values and represent the interests of the Division as a whole.
 - 1.2.2. Establish processes and provide opportunity for focused community input.
 - 1.2.3. Report Division outcomes to the community annually.
 - 1.2.4. Develop appeal procedures and hold hearings as required by statute and/or Board policy.
 - 1.2.5. Model a culture of respect and integrity.
- 1.3. Four-year Education Plan
 - 1.3.1. Provide overall direction for the Division by establishing mission and values.
 - 1.3.2. Annually approve the process and timelines for the Four-Year Education Plan.
 - 1.3.3. Identify Board priorities and goals at the outset of the annual Four-Year Education Planning process.
 - 1.3.4. Annually approve the Four-Year Education Plan, including strategic priorities and key results, for submission to Alberta Education.
 - 1.3.5. Monitor the achievement of outcomes.
 - 1.3.6. Annually evaluate the effectiveness of the Division in achieving established priorities and desired results.
 - 1.3.7. Approve the Assurance Framework Review Annual Education Results Review for distribution to the public.

1.4. Policy

- 1.4.1. Develop, approve, and monitor the implementation of policies to guide the Division.
- 1.4.2. Provide direction in those areas over which the Board wishes to retain authority.
- 1.5. Superintendent/Board relations

- 1.5.1. Select the Superintendent.
- 1.5.2. Provide the Superintendent with clear corporate direction.
- 1.5.3. Delegate, in writing, administrative authority and identify responsibility subject to provisions and restrictions in the Education Act.
- 1.5.4. Respect the authority of the Superintendent to carry out executive action and support the Superintendent's action, which are exercised within the delegated discretionary powers of the position.
- 1.5.5. Annually evaluate the Superintendent.
- 1.5.6. Annually review compensation of the Superintendent.

1.6. Advocacy

- 1.6.1. Identify issues for advocacy on an ongoing basis.
- 1.6.2. Plan for advocacy including focus, key messages, relationships and mechanisms.
- 1.6.3. Act as an advocate for public education and the Division

1.7. Board development

- 1.7.1. Develop a plan for Board/Trustee development.
- 1.7.2. Develop an annual work plan with timelines.
- 1.7.3. Annually evaluate Board effectiveness.

1.8. Fiscal accountability

- 1.8.1. Approve budget assumptions and establish priorities at the outset of the budget process.
- 1.8.2. Approve annual budget and allocation of resources.
- 1.8.3. Approve substantive budget adjustments when necessary.
- 1.8.4. Monitor the fiscal management of the Division through receipt of quarterly variance analyses and semi-annual year-end projections.
- 1.8.5. Receive the audit report and ensure the terms of engagement are met.
- 1.8.6. Approve annually the Three-Year Capital Plan for submission to Alberta Education.
- 1.8.7. Set the parameters for negotiations after soliciting advice from the Superintendent and others.
- 1.8.8. Approve conditions of employment for employees/groups.
- 1.8.9. At its discretion, ratify Memoranda of Agreement with bargaining units.
- 1.8.10. Approve transfer of funds to reserves.
- 1.8.11. Approve school fee schedules, student transportation fees, school facility rental rates, Alberta non-resident and international student tuitions, and specialized student services fees charged to other school jurisdictions.
- 1.8.12. Approve the Borrowing Resolution.
- 1.8.13. Approve the Investment Policy Statement.

2. Selected responsibilities

2.1. The Board shall retain selected authority to:

- 2.1.1. Acquire and dispose of land and buildings.
- 2.1.2. Approve the Signing Authority Matrix.
- 2.1.3. Approve Client Service Centre establishment and termination.
- 2.1.4. Approve school attendance areas.
- 2.1.5. Name schools and other Division-owned facilities.
- 2.1.6. Approve the Division school-year calendar.
- 2.1.7. Provide for Division recognition of students, staff and community.
- 2.1.8. Determine continuation of the junior high honours program.
- 2.1.9. Make a recommendation to the Minister for the dissolution of a school council.
- 2.1.10. Approve contracts and agreements as follows:
 - 2.1.10.1. Consulting contracts with purchase orders in excess of \$350,000 (dual signing authority with the Secretary-Treasurer);
 - 2.1.10.2. Personal services contracts in excess of \$200,000 (dual signing authority with the Associate Superintendent, Human Resources);
 - 2.1.10.3. The Superintendent's contract; and
 - 2.1.10.4. Non-compliant transactions over \$2,500,000 (dual signing authority with the Secretary-Treasurer).
- 2.1.11. Encourage the formation of a Committee of School Councils (COSC).
 - 2.1.11.1. If a COSC is formed, its primary purpose shall be to enhance communications among the School Councils (SCs), the Board, the Superintendent and the community.
 - 2.1.11.2. Parents with concerns are encouraged to present their concerns directly to the teacher/Principal. School personnel or individual student concerns shall not be discussed at COSC meetings.
 - 2.1.11.3. Further terms of reference and operating procedures shall be as determined by COSC.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the Board of Trustees approve the key budget assumptions for 2022-23, as presented.

BACKGROUND:

Board Policy 2: Role of the Board, 8.1 Fiscal Accountability establishes that the Board of Trustees approve the budget assumptions.

EIPS establishes assumptions that are the building blocks of the budget. Changes in key assumptions have the potential to significantly affect the budget.

This budget has been developed with the following assumptions:

1. General Operations

The first assumption is that EIPS' operations will align closely to the 2021-22 Fall Budget, with the following exceptions:

Return to normal operations including the removal of COVID costs. As school operations resume to a
more 'near normal' state, there are some best practices to come out of the pandemic such as
additional daytime custodial hours at schools as well as continued hand sanitizer usage. No other
COVID costs will be budgeted for. COVID-19 has had a major impact on the Division and its students
during the past two years; the impacts on students will be felt for several years to come. Therefore,



the focus for 2022-23 school year will turn towards increasing student learning opportunities. Additional dollars will come from reserves to support this.

 Curriculum work, introduction of a mental health strategic plan, and technology upgrades are also new focus areas.

2. Alberta Education

Alberta Education (AE) released the *Funding Manual for School Authorities 2022/23 School Year* (Funding Manual) on March 24, 2022.

Significant Changes for the 2022-23 School Year

The following three grants are new for 2022-23 and were not in the Funding Manual. Information below has been taken from communications from the province. At the time of writing this report, AE had not included how the funding will be distributed, nor if there are any restrictions associated with the monies. Should the information be provided prior to the submission of the Spring Budget, the revenue will be included with an offsetting expenditure.

Student Well-Being

Recognizing that the effects of the pandemic will be felt for several years to come, AE has ear-marked \$110 million province wide to provide targeted funding to support students experiencing academic and mental health challenges, and student well-being. Schools across the province have long acted as access points to identify support opportunities, assess needs, and connect children and youth to supportive interventions. This funding will help address pandemic-related mental health issues and provide for additional academic supports to help students catch up to grade level.

Specifically for the 2022-23 school year, \$30 million will be targeted to enable schools to support students experiencing academic challenges resulting from the pandemic and create school environments which support student well-being and positive mental health. Using total students as an allocation method, we are hopeful that we will receive \$750,000. More information will be shared later this spring as details and amounts are confirmed.

Curriculum Implementation

Over the past couple of years, the province has been working on changes to the curriculum and is now ready to roll it out. Budget 2022 included \$191 million to support curriculum implementation across all subject areas for kindergarten to Grade 12 over the next three years; with \$59 million for 2022-23 school year. The funding will support resource development, enable the purchase of new curriculum-aligned resources, and provide for teacher professional learning. This will maximize the benefits to students and teachers and strengthen learning in Alberta.

Details of how these funds will be allocated has not been provided yet. Using total students as an allocation method, and assuming half (\$29.5 million) will be for K-6 curriculum, we are hopeful that we will receive



\$740,000. On March 10, the province announced that only K-3 will be implemented for 2022-23 so we are unsure if this will impact how much will be received. This grant may actually be received in the 2021-22 school year. AE's new fiscal year started on April 1, 2022 and indications are that this funding will come before Sept. 1, 2022. Implications of this will have to be factored in once we receive details.

All curriculum work for the 2022-23 year will be funded from reserves until we receive more details on AE's curriculum grant.

<u>Dual Credit and enhancements for Career and Technology Studies</u>

There will be \$2 million available for this, and details will become available later in the government's fiscal year.

3. Other Funding

- Lease funding from AE for Strathcona Christian Secondary and Strathcona Christian Elementary has been included in the budget. Confirmation of this lease support (\$651,746) will not come until the end of June (last year's confirmation was received Oct. 19, 2021).
- Funding for Mental Health Capacity Building (MHCB) grant of \$225,061 will remain for 2022-23. Our
 contract is in place until Aug. 31, 2022; Alberta Health Services has confirmed that the contract will be
 renewed for the same annual amount for another three years until Aug. 31, 2025.
- The Program Unit Funding (PUF) students will be able to be assessed by the Dec. 1, 2022 deadline imposed by AE.
- French funding has been included in the Spring Budget in the amount of \$145,000. This is a slight reduction from 2021-22 due to a change in how the programs are split. This amount is an estimate only as the Funding Manual has not yet been updated for this grant.
- Odyssey has been removed from the Spring Budget as at this time it is not known if support will continue and for what amount.
- School Generated Funds (SGF) are anticipated to return to normal business and have been included in the Spring Budget for 100% of 2018-19 actuals as this was the last normal year of complete school operations.

4. Enrolment (Attachment 1)

The usage of Weighted Moving Average (WMA) has continued in the Funding Manual. Most of the funding (50%) is based on the number of students enrolled as of Sept. 29, 2022, so it is important that enrolment projections are developed carefully. An over-estimate would result in a risk to EIPS as the funding received in the current year will be clawed back in the subsequent year. Underestimating enrolment numbers would result in reduced funding that would not be collected until the following year.

Due to reduced enrolment in 2021-22, EIPS set aside deferred revenue in anticipation of this additional funding being clawed back in 2022-23. However, due to COVID impacts in the province, AE will once again be holding school divisions "harmless" for the reduced enrolment experienced and not clawing these funds back. This was shared with school boards during the Budget announcement on Feb. 14, 2022. The Minister



of Education has been clear that this will not be the case for 2022-23 projected enrolments; if school divisions over-estimate their enrolment, there will be a claw back in 2023-24.

For 2022-23, we continued to refine our enrolment estimation process developed four years ago and are more confident in the numbers provided to AE. In January 2022, enrolment was estimated to be 17,219 for Sept. 29, 2022 – 95 more students than fall of 2021. The January estimate was made assuming that 2022-23 will be a normal year, and that most students who left to home education or deferred kindergarten for a year would return. The 2022 funding envelope from AE is based on this. As current projected 2022-23 enrolment is less than 17,219, deferred revenue will need to be established for the 2022-23 year. The net change of increases/decreases in enrolment will be set up as a receivable or deferred revenue. In this case, we are seeing a decrease. Final deferred revenue will be calculated in the fall.

Since January, the re-registration process has been completed and enrolment on March 14 was 16,942 (with adjustments for kindergarten and Next Step Outreach). The revenue on the funding profile has been reduced to reflect this decrease.

Enrolment of 16,750 (excluding the Next Step schools) has been determined.

Five years of enrolment data is below (excluding Next Step schools and Elk Island Youth Ranch*).

Enrolment for Outreach is currently estimated to be lower than 2021-22 levels by 49 students at 192.

Total enrolment at this time is estimated to be 16,942. There is still some uncertainty regarding this number. The economy was showing signs of recovery from the pandemic; however, the war in Ukraine is leading to economic instability. There is also the potential for Ukraine refugees to settle with families in the area given the high Ukrainian population and resources available in their native language. EIPS is anticipating there could be a small number of students who decide to leave the Division for home education due to health concerns with in-person schooling. Enrolment will continue to be adjusted from now until the fall. EIPS has set aside some dollars in To Be Allocated (TBA - a fiscal contingency holding account) for potential enrolment reductions.



The Weighted Moving Average for 2022-23 is as follows:

5. Compensation

Salary grid movement and benefit increases have been factored into standard costs.

The use of standard costs for certificated and classified staff at the schools ensures staffing decisions are based on hiring the best person as opposed to the actual cost of individuals. It also provides timely reporting to aid monitoring and projections at the schools as costs are charged over ten months instead of tied to how individuals are paid.

The goal is to develop a standard cost for use by schools and ensure it is as close to actual as possible. A standard cost set too high will create a surplus that should have been spent on current year students. A standard cost set too low will create a deficit that must be paid from funds designated for students in future years. Neither situation is ideal but the risk to the Division is greater if a deficit is created.

a) <u>Standard Costs – Schools</u>

- To reduce the Division's risk to large surplus or deficit in certificated standard costs, staffing was examined in detail to identify the actual staff assignments expected for 2022-23 and from this list, actual salary costs were calculated based on each individual's placement on the grid with adjustment for salary increments expected to be earned during 2022-23.
- Certificated standard costs are impacted by retirements (and their replacements), maternity leaves (and their replacements), sick leaves, full-time to part-time FTE changes, grid movement (including its timing), economic adjustments (none this year) and benefit changes.
- A key assumption this year is that permanent staff FTE stays the same as of February 2022 and that probationary teacher contracts from 2021-22 (41.62 FTE) will be rehired for 2022-23 to cover new leaves.
- The increase of probationary and temporary teaching positions decreases overall standard cost because our staffing mix has a reduced number of more experienced teachers than there would have been in prior years.

<u>Classified standard costs were calculated in the same conservative manner as last year</u>

- A weighted average salary of all employees within each paygrade was calculated with the following exceptions:
 - The standard cost rate for all positions except Educational Assistants (EAs) was determined by averaging permanent staff pay rates only, which is the same process as 2021-22 except for EAs.



- For 2022-23, an EA blended rate averaging the cost of permanent and hourly EAs was calculated.
- The following factors were considered: increments (grid movement) were projected to Aug. 31, 2022, and for 2022-23, economic adjustments (none this year), vacation costs and benefit rate changes.

b) <u>Standard Cost – Benefits</u>

- Benefit changes to both certificated and classified staff were also considered.
- Alberta School Employee Benefits Plan (ASEBP) has indicated that the premium rate increase for 2022-23 will be limited to 7.7% (2021-22 7.85%) overall with additional increases in the next two years anywhere from 5% to 8%; depending on plan experience. In the area of extended health care, the monthly premium has increased for the family rate by \$13.50/month (5.25% increase), and the dental family rate has increased \$2.22/month (1.35% increase). Although these increases are not as much as last year, they are still higher than historically experienced.
- Overall premium rates for ASEBP have increased at a rate of only 1.56% per year over the past 10 years. This is largely due to premium subsidies the ASEBP Trustees were able to apply because of excess investment returns. ASEBP cannot continue to provide subsidies to the same magnitude of those historically provided at this time. Last year the ASEBP Trustees committed to working towards balancing premium rates with actual benefit costs over three years.
 - The Experience Adjustment for Life Insurance, Accidental Death & Dismemberment and Extended Disability is a 5% discount (2021-22 10% discount).
 - Board supported benefit premiums for Life/AD&D, Extended Disability, Extended Health Care,
 Dental and Vision are 100% for both certificated and classified staff.
 - Health Spending Account (HSA) and Wellness Spend Account (WSA) costs have been estimated based on usage of 100% (2021-22 100%).
- CPP rates have increased by 4.4% from 5.7% to 5.95%.
- o EI maximum insurable earnings increased by \$800 from \$60,300 to \$61,000.
- WCB premiums have decreased by \$0.05 per \$100 of earnings (or 7.0%), primarily for classified staff.
- Local Authorities Pension Plan (LAPP) contribution rates for 2022 for classified staff will remain at 2022 rates as no increase has been approved; no change in rates is projected for 2023. Note that during 2021-22, LAPP unexpectantly reduced the contribution rate for 2022, so 2021-22 rates were budgeted higher than are being incurred.

To give the Board an example of increased benefit costs for an employee earning \$85,000, with Family benefits:

- Dental, vision and health family rate has increased by \$195,
- CPP/EI is \$217.74 more,
- Life and AD&D is \$3.36 more,
- Extended disability is \$151.13 more, and
- WCB is \$42.50 less.



- Certificated standard cost will decrease 1.8% (\$1,935) to \$105,000 (\$92,133 in salary and \$12,867 in benefits). With 825 FTE budgeted as active, that decrease equates to \$1,597,255. The breakdown of the net decrease was a \$2,224 decrease in salary and a \$376 increase in benefits. The decrease in salary is due to the expected use of Temporary staff to fill new leaves, and teachers with less years of experience to replace those who retire or resign. Temporary staff and teachers with fewer years of experience have a lower average grid rate, which lowers the overall expected salaries for the year. The decrease to salaries more than offsets the increase to benefits, resulting in an overall decrease to the standard cost rate. In 2021-22, EIPS estimated standard costs too high as evidenced by the standard cost surplus.
- The classified standard cost changes range from an increase of 0.4% to 4.3% due to grid movement, removing hourly staff from the average and changes in benefit costs. Due to blending permanent EAs with hourly EAs, the EA salary rate has decreased from 2021-22.

Once allocations to schools are finalized, standard cost will need to be revisited. Staffing changes may be greater than anticipated.

6. Reserves:

AE has now confirmed with school divisions what their Operating Reserve Limit will be for the year ending August 31, 2023. It is based on the number of students, i.e., if a division has >6,000 students their Operating Reserve Limit is 3.15% (if <6,000 students it is 4.95%) of their Operating Expenses as of August 31, 2022. We are currently projecting this to be \$6,073,976, see Attachment 3 of the *Budget 2022-23 Overview Report*. There are more details on this calculation still being finalized.

Once AE has received divisions' Audited Financial Statements and reviewed them in November 2023, they will be "recovering" the excess of the Operating Reserve Limit in December 2023.

School Divisions will not be allowed to request a transfer of funds from Operating Reserves to Capital Reserves to avoid the recovery of excess funds over the Operating Reserve Limit. Should divisions desire to transfer funds, we are required to provide details on specific projects, costs and timelines involved, etc. Like prior years, the Minister will review these prior to granting approval.

Due to the significant changes in the management of reserves, the details in this section of the report will be presented in the *Allocations and Use of Reserves Report*.

7. Expenses

a) Insurance

In 2020-21, EIPS changed insurance providers due to the 271% liability insurance premium increase in 2019-20 under its former insurance partner, ASBIE. EIPS is now with the Genesis Reciprocal and experienced a significant decrease in insurance premiums for 2020-21. As the insurance market continues to be a "hard" market, consistent with last year, we are estimating a range of increases from

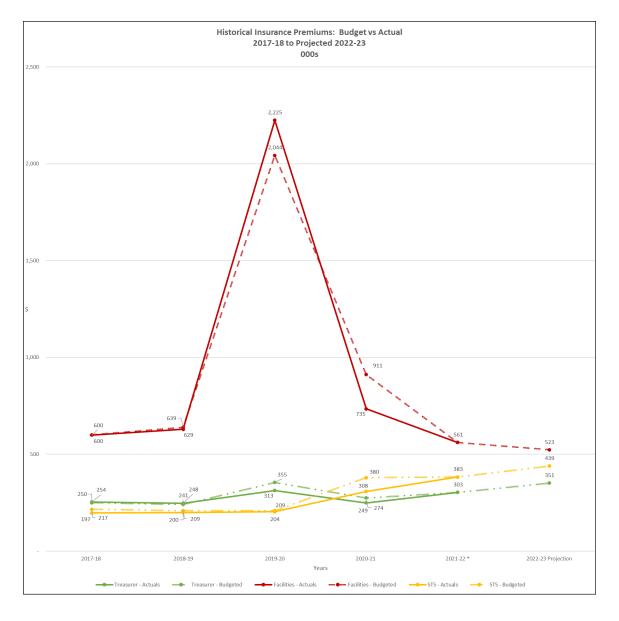


10% - 15% for liability and property coverage and 20% to 25% for contracted bus operators – assuming no large losses within the program or even within the province. If these happen, there could be a further negative impact on next year's rates. To be conservative, the budget will be built with higher percentages for each category of insurance premiums for 2022-23.

The chart on the following page shows the historical insurance expense, budget vs actuals, for each coverage category in Facility Services, Student Transportation Services, and Secretary-Treasurer's budgets for the past five years as well as the projected expense for 2022-23.

Overall, the total net increase for insurance by department has been:

- Secretary-Treasurer = 38% [2018 actuals of \$254K to \$351K projected for 2023]
- o Facilities = -13% [2018 actuals of \$600K to \$523K projected for 2023]
- Student Transportation Services = 123% [2018 actuals of \$197K to \$439K projected for 2023]





b) Carbon Tax

Carbon tax costs will continue to be factored into the budget. The current rate is \$50/tonne effective April 1, 2022. This increase equates to 2.2 cents per litre. Since inception the increase has been 11.0 cents per litre, and by 2030 the tax could be 37.43 cents per litre - an increase of 467% over 10 years! In December 2021, the Federal Government moved to accelerate the price on carbon pollution through to 2030 with a new policy, "2030 Emissions Reduction Plan" which references carbon pricing. The Department of Finance published the following on December 3, 2021:

"The fuel charge rates reflect a carbon pollution price of \$65 per tonne of carbon dioxide equivalent (CO2e) in 2023 (the price currently reaches \$50 per tonne in 2022), which will rise by \$15 per tonne annually to reach \$170 per tonne in 2030. These rates are based on global warming factors and emissions factors used by Environment and Climate Change Canada to report Canada's emissions to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change. Rate changes come into effect on April 1 of each year."

If implemented into law, this will have significant impact on the Division's budget from busing, school fees, utilities, through to most purchased goods and services as vendors increase prices to recover the impact of the tax on their operations.

c) Hold Harmless

Hold Harmless in Facilities (utilities) and HR (sick leave and maternity leave). A lot of these are based on three-year averages. EIPS will use 2018-19, 2017-18, and 2016-17 but adjusted for any rate changes and/or non-COVID trends (2019-20 and 2020-21 have too many COVID implications built into them to use in the average calculation).

8. <u>Inflation</u>

There are inflationary non-salary costs that are expected to increase. The overall consumer price index (CPI) for the province has increased significantly by 5.5% from February 2021 to February 2022 (February 2020 to February 2021 was 0.6%). While the CPI is not reflective of all costs a school board would incur, there are many similarities such as furnishings, equipment, food for CTS courses, reading materials, etc. These inflationary costs will be covered by schools and departments. Of note for utilities and busing costs, of all commodity category increases, energy increased the most at 31.3% ** (Feb. 2020 to Feb. 2021 was 9.2%).

9. System and Administration (SA)

This targeted grant remains at the 2021-22 funding level at \$6,297,328. EIPS has reviewed the prescribed list and is confident it will be below the grant maximum threshold. As in 2021-22, any unused portions can be used towards other Board expenditures such as instruction.



10. Department Estimates

The draft budget presented to the Board on May 25, 2022 will include a list of major assumptions and estimates used by departments to prepare budgets.

COMMUNICATION PLAN:

Once approved, the budget assumptions will be incorporated into the 2022-23 Budget. Leadership will be asked to submit balanced budgets which will be consolidated into the Division Budget.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

That the Board of Trustees approve a transfer from Division Unallocated Operating Reserves to Division Allocated Reserves of \$5,332,598 (Attachment 3, Page 3 – Column D, Row M).

That the Board of Trustees approve 2022-23 funding in the amount of \$6,430,598 from the Division Allocated Operating Reserves for Focus on Unfinished Learning, Consultants: Assessment, Numeracy, Early Learning, Career Pathways, and Professional Development, and other projects (Attachment 3, Page 3 – Column B, Row L).

That the Board of Trustees approve a transfer from Division Unallocated Capital Reserves to Division Allocated Capital Reserves of \$1,365,000 (Attachment 3, Page 2 – Column H).

That the Board of Trustees approve a transfer from Division Operating Reserves to Division Allocated Capital Reserves of \$1,000,000 (Attachment 3, Page 3 – Column D, Row N).

That the Board of Trustees approve the use of capital reserves for a total of \$1,042,000 (Attachment 3, Page 2 – Column G).

That the Board of Trustees approve the use of reserves and allocations for 2022-23 as presented in this report.

BACKGROUND:

Board Policy 2: Role of the Board, section 8.2 Fiscal Accountability establishes that the Board of Trustees approve the budget allocation of resources.

CONSIDERATION AND ANALYSIS:

EIPS establishes assumptions and allocations that are the building blocks of the 2022-23 budget. The proposed use of reserves and allocation of funds allows schools and departments to maintain and invest in essential services and supports the Division's mission, values, and priorities.

The 2022-23 funding announcement contained a number of new items that have been highlighted in the April 7, 2022 *Budget Overview Report* summarized below:

- 1% increase to Base Funding for ECS and Gr. 1-12,
- 1% increase to Operations and Maintenance,
- 4.6% increase to Student Transportation,
- Adjustments between grant categories,
- New grants for: Student Wellbeing, Curriculum, and New School Grant, and
- School division are 'held harmless' for a second year in a row (2020-21 and 2021-22) due to the continued impact of COVID on enrolment levels. As the economy recovers, children return to the classroom from online or home education, etc., there should be more stability year-to-year leading to Alberta Education returning in 2022-23 to the intended recovery of funds when enrolment is overestimated.

Although the net result of these items is that EIPS' funding envelope is relatively close to that of 2021, there was a significant amount of work to determine the impact of changes to schools, program areas, reserves usage, etc. Administration has reviewed these changes, along with assumptions and enrolment numbers presented in the April 7th Assumptions Report and April 7th Reserve Discussion Update and have been able to maintain much of our operations in the Division.

Finally, our projected financial position to the end of Aug. 31, 2022 is showing an increase to our reserves. This report contains a plan to use those reserves to provide some one-time special initiatives for our students in the upcoming year in the areas of: focus on unfinished learning, consultants to assist with Assessment, Numeracy, Early Learning as well as Career Pathways, new curriculum, and mental health initiatives. Funds are also identified health and wellness initiatives for staff, investment in technology and other infrastructure – to name just a few. This is a year where the Division has the flexibility to invest in students, staff, and infrastructure to set itself up for success in the future when the restrictions on reserve usage becomes a reality.

Use of Reserves (Attachment 1)

Even though we were told two years ago that "The requirement for ministerial approval of spending or transferring operating reserves is a two-year temporary measure", going forward, Alberta Education will still require school divisions to request ministerial approval to access operating reserves. This includes SGF, all reserves at schools and departments (including Student Transportation) and Division allocated and unallocated reserves. In addition, school divisions will also need to request approval to transfer to operating reserves. It will be very important to ensure EIPS budgets the correct amount of reserve usage.



The following assumptions were made when administration examined reserves and the limitations imposed upon their usage.

- The Minister will approve 100% of our reserve expenditure requests for 2022-23.
 - Currently, there has been no indication of a reserve cap across the province (in 2020-21 there was a \$100 million province-wide cap). We have inquired as to the reserve cap for 2022-23 and were told, "Alberta Treasury Board & Finance Department has not yet given a reserve usage target to the Minister of Education; therefore, Alberta Education is under the assumption that the Minister has full authority to approve requests."
- Use of Division Allocated Operating Reserves (all the projects approved for 2022-23) all the amounts budgeted for will be used 100%.
- There is **no restriction** on the balance of operating reserve balances for Aug. 31, 2022.

In February, schools and departments prepared forecasts using January actuals. Schools and departments will be allowed to enter up to 1% of their surplus carryforward when they complete their budgets.

We build the budget with how much of the reserves we want to access and then we must send it to the Minister with the Spring Budget. If we want to ask for more reserves after the Spring Budget, we must submit a request to the Minister (may or may not be approved) and the response time may be quite slow.

Because of the above restrictions:

- EIPS will estimate (on a consolidated basis) 1% of reserve carryforward for schools and departments. Schools and departments will only carryforward the surplus they truly end with (up to 1%), but the Division will project estimated surpluses at 1% for all.
- Student Transportation will include its entire reserve carryforward as it is targeted.
- EIPS will also assume that schools and departments will use 100% of their reserves in 2022-23. That is why you see the estimated reserve balances for schools and departments to be zero on Aug. 31, 2023. It is likely schools and departments will not do this, but if we do not make this assumption and they do use it all, we will be in trouble as we cannot use more reserves than we budgeted for).
- SGF we will estimate a 40% reduction in balances.

Asset Retirement Obligation

Due to the Public Sector Accounting Standards Board issuing a new standard related to Asset Retirement Obligation (ARO), Elk Island Public Schools will have a legal obligation associated with the retirement of tangible capital assets that are controlled by the Division. For EIPS, costs associated with retirement are associated with asbestos remediation. EIPS has been in discussions with Alberta Education and assume that the amount of required depreciation for the 2022-23 school year related to these assets will not be deducted from in-year educational dollars. Rather, the future costs will be noted in our financial statements, and properly funded at a later time by the province as part of a school's modernization or replacement school budget to offset the



expense. This obligation will be carried year-to-year separately in its own category in Accumulated Surplus. The deficit is not applied to operating or capital reserves.

Administration is assuming the introduction of the Asset Retirement Obligation (ARO) will not be impacted by the rules regarding Accumulated Deficit from Operations (ADO). Alberta Education does not think that the ARO will have an impact on the ADO situation for school boards but requires confirmation before stating definitively.

- The "Funding Manual for School Authorities 2022/23 School Year" includes the following regarding the ADO (pages 126 and 127):
 - "1. School boards are prohibited from budgeting or incurring an accumulated operating deficit (ADO). A budgeted annual operating deficit is acceptable if sufficient accumulated surplus from operations (ASO) is available to cover the planned shortfall. School jurisdictions must include changes to projected ASO balances, with sufficient variance explanations, in their monthly financial reporting information to Alberta Education. If sufficient ASO is not available to cover the projected shortfall, jurisdiction must make spending adjustments equivalent to the ADO prior to the end of the current school year and reflect these adjustments via monthly reporting submission to Alberta Education."
 - "2. November 30 is the deadline for school jurisdictions to submit Audited Financial Statements (AFS) for the previous school year. A school jurisdiction submitting an AFS with an accumulated deficit from operations (ADO) will be expected to eliminate the ADO by the end of the current school year by making spending adjustments equivalent to the ADO and reflect these adjustments via monthly reporting submissions to Alberta Education."

As can be seen on the Accumulated Surplus page, that it is anticipated that by Aug. 31, 2023 that our Division will be in an Accumulated Operating Deficit solely due to the Asset Retirement Obligation.

Division Unallocated Reserves

The Division Unallocated Operating Reserve is to cover potential emergent issues and price fluctuations, and to stabilize funding in future years. In prior years, the Board has tried to maintain the Division Unallocated Reserve at a minimum of 2% of EIPS budgeted operating expenses, or approximately \$4 million. Going forward, the Division will have to balance this amount against the Operating Reserve Limit. A capital effect of \$831,000 has been included in the 2022-23 estimates as capital assets purchased in the current year are offset by amortization from prior year purchases creating a surplus in the reserve. The capital effect has been split into two components – the annual amortization less the assets being purchased from operating budgets [1,351,485 – 520,485].

The plan for reserve usage has been built into the allocations and is shown on Attachment 1. As previously mentioned, the Division is undertaking several projects that are focused on students, staff and strengthening the infrastructure utilized for student learning. Funds for the items detailed on Attachment 1 will be transferred from Division Unallocated Reserves to Division Allocated Reserves (transfer shown on Attachment 3, page 3).

Use of SGF

It is difficult to determine how much schools will decrease their reserve balance in 2022-23. Administration has estimated a total of \$601,960 (40% of current reserves). This is consistent with last year's estimation of \$436,476 (39% of current reserves).

Use of Capital Reserves

Capital Reserves can be used for the purchase of future capital assets and can be accessed with Board approval. Every year, capital items are purchased from the operating budget in schools and departments (\$100,000 to \$500,000 per year). These items could be designated to be paid from capital reserves in any given year by the Board. To access capital reserves for operating expenses, the Division would have to obtain permission from the Minister.

EIPS Division Unallocated Capital Reserve – The estimated available balance at Aug. 31, 2022 is \$1,485,689.

Equipment costs for schools

- If the cost is >\$5,000 and lasts longer than one year it could be covered by capital reserves.
- The internal cap that has been placed on schools (1% of operations) can prohibit schools from saving for those bigger capital items they might need in their CTS areas, for example.
- Some schools have significant SGF that can be used to facilitate the purchase (unrestricted earned using CTS equipment such as cafeteria sales).
- For those schools that do not have the operational savings or the unrestricted SGF, an option would be to set aside an amount of capital reserves.
- In the last few years there were various items replaced at schools. It would be prudent to put aside \$1,000,000 of capital reserves overall and only replenish this once used. Capital expenditures would be subject to Superintendent review and approved if a school has no unrestricted SGF and no operating budget to support the purchase.

Consolidated Capital Plan:

Administration has developed a three-year plan for Facility Services, Information Technology, and schools and is presented in the following table. Funds will come from EIPS Division Allocated Capital Reserves.

Types of technology changes rapidly and useful life is also relatively short. EIPS has expended funds to catch up to where we need to be, and now a plan is in place for funding future capital expenditures. This plan will be reviewed again when the Division Technology Plan is updated 2022-23.

Reserves Detail (Attachment 2)

A detailed listing of the projects listed on the "Operating Reserves – Three Year Projection" (page 3 of Attachment 1) has been prepared and forms Attachment 2 to this report. For each project, in addition to the description, is discussion on how the project impacts students as well at the Divisional risks that are being mitigated by undertaking the project.

Allocations (Attachment 3)

Accumulated Surplus (pg. 1)

As per above, the budget allocations include the use of Operating Reserves.

Accumulated surplus is projected to be (\$2.41) million at Aug. 31, 2023 comprised of:

- (\$14.94) million in Asset Retirement Obligation.
- \$4.23 million in operating reserves (pg. 2):
 - Schools and Central Services operating reserves are projected to be \$0.90 million;
 - Division Allocated Operating reserve is projected to be \$0; and
 - Division Unallocated Operating reserve is projected to be \$3.92 million (1.95% of \$200.61 million);
 - Minimum level is 2.0% of budget (approximately \$4.0 million).
- \$1.44 million in capital reserves.
- \$6.27 million in Investment in Tangible Capital Assets.

Reserves for Operating Expenditures (pg. 2)

- Operating Reserves Central Services & Schools is being accessed for \$2.48 million.
- Division Allocated Reserve will be funded and then be accessed for \$6.43 million for Division projects.
- Division Unallocated Reserve will fund Division Unallocated Reserves by \$6.33 million for Division projections (refer to page 3 for list).
- A capital effect of \$831,000 has been included in the 2022-23 estimates as capital assets purchased in the current year are offset by amortization from prior year purchases creating a surplus in the reserve.



The capital effect has been split into two components – the annual amortization less the assets being purchased from operating budgets (1,351,485 – 520,485) on page 3.

Operating Reserves – Three Year Projection (pg. 3)

In addition to the proposed changes for 2022-23, estimates have also been completed for 2023-24 and 2024-25 to outline estimated future needs. Alberta Education typically requires a projection of the use of Accumulated Surplus and Reserves for 2023-24 and 2024-25 as part of the Budget Report submitted to them. Each year, Administration will bring to the Board for approval the use of Division reserves.

Revenue and Reserve Summary (pgs. 4 & 5)

Revenue has been adjusted for:

- Alberta Education excluding small grant amounts in the 'other' category (pg. 5)
- Other Government of Alberta
- Other sales and services
- Investment income
- Gifts and donations

The total funding envelope received from the province was relatively similar to last year. In the Basic Instruction category, funding changes that occurred were due to year-over-year changes to enrolment and the impact to the WMA on the formulas used to calculate each grant.

When looking at Alberta Education Revenue, there is a difference from the fall of 2021-22 to spring of 2022-23 because we are dealing with adjustments to each revenue line for recalculations in the weighted moving average. In addition, there are Alberta Education Revenues included under "other" that are not included in the Funding Profile.

Allocations Summary (pg. 9)

Being able to draw upon operating reserves this year means that the Division is able to fund several initiatives discussed in the Use of Reserves section of this report.

Schools (pg. 10)

For 2022-23, the certificated standard cost rate has decreased as has the Educational Assistant rate. Same as 2021-22, a single rate for permanent and hourly classified staff will be used, but for 2022-23 a blended (permanent and hourly) Educational Assistant rate has been calculated.

Subsequent to presenting the Budget Overview of April 7, Alberta Education has responded favorably to EIPS' request to reduce the student enrolment for Andrew School back to 53 (EIPS submitted number) from 54 (Alberta Education's arbitrarily adjusted number). With having Andrew School's enrolment inflated, there was a risk that should those students not be enrolled in the fall, then Alberta Education would claw back the excess funding next year; deferred revenue had been set up in anticipation. The effect of having the Rural School Grant reduced accordingly is that \$171,700 has been added to Bridge funding, will not be clawed back next year and deferred revenue has been reduced.

Financial Impact by School (pg. 14)

This page shows the net effect of enrolment changes, allocation changes and estimated standard cost changes (using last year's staffing).

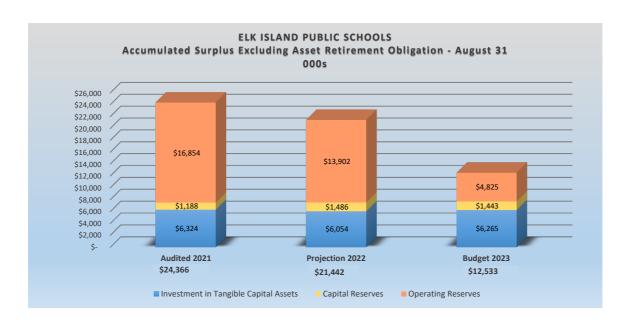

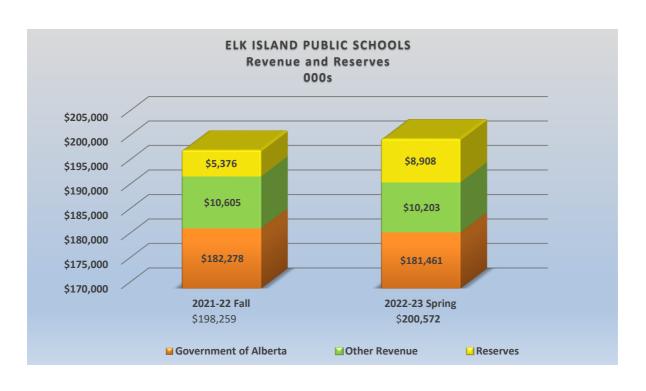

Revenue & Reserve Notes

A. Other Government of Alberta

\$541K decrease (11%)

The Wye Elementary School demolition and abatement grant was included in the 2021-22 amount (\$112K) and this work has been completed this year. The remaining decrease is due to the decrease in supported amortization from Alberta Infrastructure.

B. Other Alberta School Authorities

\$357K decrease (66.5%)

In 2021-22, EIPS operated a low incidence team (in place of Regional Collaborative Service Delivery which was discontinued in 2019-20). For 2022-23, EIPS will no longer be operating the low incident team (\$355K). The needs of our students will be met through our own staffing.

C. Reserves \$3,532 increase (66%)

Schools and departments are expected to use their 1% carryforward, and it is estimated 40% of the school generated funds (SGF) will be used in 2022-23 (same assumption as last year). The Division Allocated and Unallocated Reserves will be used as outlined on the 3-year reserve plan (page 3, Attachment 3).

Alberta Education Revenue Notes

D. Base Funding

\$332K increase (0.3%)

Increase due to 1% increase in base funding rates offset by a decrease in WMA enrolment FTE. As well, the rural small schools all decreased funding levels from the prior year due to decreases in their WMA enrolment FTE.

E. Services and Supports

\$827K decrease (5%)

The decrease in services and supports is due to a decrease in the moderate language delay grant of \$284K and Specialized Learning Support Kindergarten of \$258K primarily due to less students in these two categories. Last year, Alberta Education over-estimated these students, and this year, the Division has made the estimates to more accurate numbers.

The revenue decrease for the Institutional Programs is still being investigated.

Other than above explanations, the remaining decreases are due to decreases in the WMA enrolment FTE. Rates did not change for any grants in this category.

F. Operations and Maintenance Grant

\$491K increase (3.3%)

The increase is primarily due to an increase in the utilized space (funded for the increase in space) and an increase of 1% in funding rates.

G. Transportation

\$473K increase (4.6%)

Increase is due to the transportation grant increasing by 4.6%.

H. Infrastructure Maintenance and Renewal (IMR)

\$452K decrease (17%)

We are assuming that Facility Services will be able to spend 100% of the 2021-22 IMR funding this year. Going forward, the IMR budget will not be reduced for a capital component as specific projects have not been assigned as of yet.

I. Additional \$157K decrease (1.9%)

This funding is what was remaining after the five envelopes were calculated and Alberta Education allocated it out to school divisions in a lump sum. The funds were adjusted this year to ensure our funding envelope is the same balance as last year. (School boards were to be held harmless for the drop in enrolment due to COVID). Going forward into 2023-24, we do not know how much of the Bridge funding will be available to each Division. Bridge funding monies were to be used to support school divisions that are growing (WMA enrolment FTE increases). From the three-year budget plan, the government is committed to supporting education with increasing amounts each year; however, how that translates to each individual school division will need to be seen.

J. Other Alberta Education Revenue

\$357K decrease (22%)

The Odyssey Languages Assistant Program grant (\$125K) has been removed as we are unsure if this will continue. It does not impact allocations. The grant funding for the six modulars (\$205K) moved in 2020-21 has now been completely expended and there are no modular grant dollars for 2022-23.

K. Supported Amortization

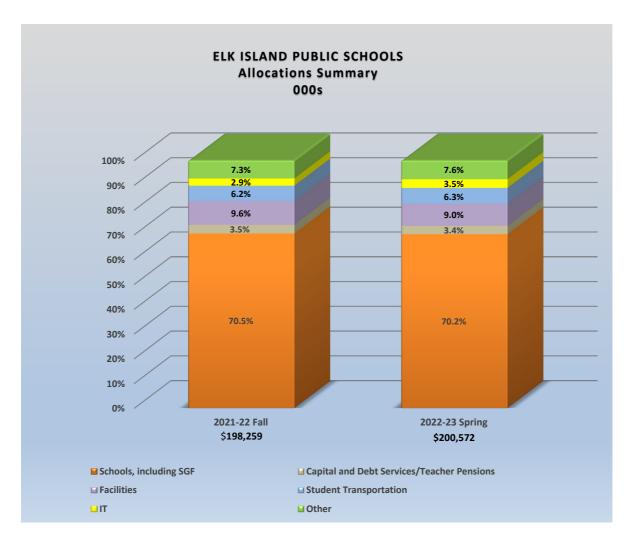
\$217K increase (26%)

This amount is increasing due to the expected capitalization of the 2021-22 CMR.

L. Teacher Pension \$0K change (0.0%)

The teacher pension has remained at 2021-22 budget amount for now. This will be updated when the budget is submitted to the Board in May. This has no impact on allocations.

Schools Notes

A. Basic Allocations

\$1,385K decrease (1.5%)

Basic allocations have been reduced to schools.

In 2021-22, to offset the impacts of the increase in standard cost of 1.7% (\$1,765/FTE), EIPS allocation rates to schools were increased by 2.34% and allocated out to schools based on their spring enrolment estimates. Allocations to schools were increased by \$1.83 million.

In 2021-22, there have been significant standard cost surpluses identified (both classified and certificated) as estimates were too conservative. As a result of this, standard costs have been reviewed, recalculated, and reduced to better align with actual costs. Allocations were reduced to balance the budget; however, they were not reduced by the same amount that standard costs decreased, thereby leaving more dollars in the schools for 2022-23.

B. School Programs

\$472 decrease (36.1%)

There have been less allocations for various programs this year due to:

- \$312K less allocated out for FNMI as there has been less funding and there will still be more allocations to be made in upcoming months to schools
- ESL allocation has also gone down \$25K due to less funding
- no FSL allocation of \$17K and no French Immersion allocation of \$34K as funds are being used to support a French Immersion consultant
- Institution allocation of \$75K was allocated under "Other" rather than School Programs as we are still working on the funding with Alberta Education

C. Early Learning and Specialized Supports

\$2,314K decrease (12.1%)

In the Spring Budget, allocations for these two areas are always lower to schools than the fall. This is because funds are held back in the spring to ensure the funds are allocated to where the students are and where the biggest needs are. Under Supports for Students, Early Learning and

Specialized Supports Schools, there is \$2,040K remaining and most, if not all of this will be allocated to schools in the fall.

D. Other \$413K decrease (22.1%)

This has primarily decreased as the fall 2021-22 numbers included enrolment adjustments made in the fall (once enrolment was finalized).

E. Year-End Carryforward

\$100K decrease (10.1%)

2021-22 Fall Budget reflected the August 31, 2021 actual surplus up to 1% reported at the schools. This year, the year-end carryforward is the estimated 1% carryforward only for schools.

F. TBA/In Year Funding and Division Unallocated Reserves

\$3,200K increase (82.8%)

Increase is due to holding various amounts in the Spring Budget due to uncertainties that will not be resolved until the fall of \$2,725K. This includes an enrolment cushion of \$500K for students that may or may not arrive in the fall, \$300K for classified standard cost cushion that can be released in the fall once classified EA costs are reviewed and the remainder of \$1,925K is being held for In-Year Funding to be disbursed in the fall. Last fall, only \$147K remained in this category.

In addition, there are some amounts that are being held for very specific purposes:

Finally, the increase is also due to reserve carryforwards for schools and departments up to the 1% totaling \$547K (this was \$6K in the fall).

G. Division Year End Carryforward

\$542K increase (9553%)

This is the estimated reserves needed for schools and departments to come in at the full 1% carryforward available. This will be adjusted to actuals in the fall.

Schools Notes

H. Early Learning

\$560K increase (25.9%)

The majority of this will be allocated to schools in the fall. In the spring, some funds are held to ensure students arriving after the Spring Budget are supported and also to ensure students that have the highest needs are met. It is prudent not to allocate these dollars and staff until we know these students are arriving for certain.

Increase to the block is for the partial allocation for a director and an Occupational Therapist (OT) position. In addition, \$250K was given as a one-time allocation to Early Learning to help offset the large reduction in revenue that this area was seeing due to the substantial drop in moderate language delays and severe Pre-K and K students.

I. Specialized Supports Schools

\$1,480K increase (81.6%)

The majority of this will be allocated to schools in the fall. In the spring, funds are held onto to ensure students arriving after the Spring Budget are supported and to ensure students that have the highest needs are funded.

The increase to the block was \$78K for increased needs and \$50K for the replacement of the low incidence team.

The Division Unallocated Reserves are to support the Mental Health Strategic Plan which includes professional development and three FSLWs.

Facilities Services has an increase of \$905K to their block allocation for the following increases: \$295K to keep custodial daytime cleaning to eight hours per day; \$44K for insurance; \$45K for fuel; \$456K in electricity and natural gas; and \$65K in custodial supply costs.

There is a projected increase in reserves carryforward of \$35K.

Funding from Division Unallocated Reserves of \$264K is for hand sanitizer of \$120K and video surveillance of \$134K and community consultation of \$10K.

The one-time allocation for \$40K was also removed (related to FNMI flag allocation).

The COVID cost allocation of \$1,441K has been removed as this was related to COVID costs and will not continue into 2022-23. This included costs for deep cleaning at night, personal protective equipment, additional daytime custodial hours and cleaning supplies.

Supplemental revenue is assumed to be the same at this time, (includes the assumption of Alberta Education lease support of \$652K), and facility rentals. Facility rental income will be adjusted for the May budget submission to the Board.

Targeted funding has decreased by \$317K as last year this contained the grant related to the demolition and abatement of the old Wye School for \$112K and the remaining grant dollars related to moving six modulars \$205K.

C. Infrastructure Maintenance and Renewal

\$452 K decrease 16.7%

We are assuming that Facility Services will be able to spend 100% of the 2021-22 IMR funding this year. Going forward, the IMR budget will not be reduced for a capital component as specific projects have not been assigned as of yet.

- \$145K for data visualization programmer (1.0 FTE \$115K) and Division licenses for related software of \$30K
- \$71K for software costs for enterprise form solution software (safe arrival and forms management)
- \$113K for security software (advanced threat protection solution)
- \$48K for additional software costs (annual cost increases)
- \$41K for disaster recovery solution (data back-up solution)
- \$22K Shaw/Axia SuperNet increase

The change in One time allocation of \$286K is comprised of:

- A one-time allocation of \$337K for additional evergreening of staff/student computers (help offset the anticipated request for 2023-24)
- Completion of network project for \$51K

Division Unallocated Reserves of \$661K will be funding the following:

EIPS PRIORITY: Enhance high-quality learning and working environments.

EIPS GOAL: Quality infrastructure for all.

EIPS OUTCOME: Student learning is supported through the use of effective planning,

management and investment in Division infrastructure.

RECOMMENDATION

That the Board of Trustees approve the 2022-23 school fees, as presented.

BACKGROUND:

In January 2022, the Board set parameters for the 2022-23 school fees. The parameters were set to ensure students achieve a quality education, but also to ensure that fees are not cost-prohibitive for parents. Below is the list of parameters to guide principals in establishing 2022-23 school fees:

Fee Type	Parameter
Optional courses	Cost recovery only. Maximum increase of 5% and 7% for food courses. Requires an explanation. *

Noon supervision	Cost recovery only. Maximum increase of 5%. Requires an explanation. *
Activity fees (field trips)	Cost recovery only. Fees can be increased >5%. Requires an explanation.
Extra-curricular	Cost recovery only. Fees can be increased >5%. Requires an explanation.
Non-curricular travel (overnight ski or band trips)	Cost recovery only. Fees can be increased >5%. Requires an explanation.
Non-curricular goods and services (Student Union)	Cost recovery only. Maximum increase of 5%. Requires an explanation.

^{*}The increases above will continue to allow for the cost increases in goods and services. Fee increases higher than the above parameters for optional courses and noon supervision would be considered in exceptional circumstances.



CONSIDERATION AND ANALYSIS:

As the Alberta economy continues to recover from the impacts of COVID-19, there are now new factors such as the conflict in Ukraine hitting the global economy and affecting the prices of many goods in our province. As always, EIPS aims to provide high-quality education by balancing the budget constraints with the fiscal realities of our families.

Schools were encouraged to be generic, if possible, when setting fees to allow teachers flexibility when unforeseen circumstances arise. For example, when a field trip is cancelled due to weather, they can replace it with a new field trip at the same cost without the need for additional approval.

EIPS sent the parameters to schools once they were approved by the Board and the process, as described in Attachment 1, was followed to the best of each school's ability.

School fees that exceed established parameters (fees for optional courses, noon supervision and non-curricular goods and serves greater than 5% or greater than 7% for food courses) are listed in Attachment 2. New courses or programs are listed in Attachment 3. Change in fees per student from 2021-22 to 2022-23 are shown in Attachment 4. The report is organized from highest to \$10 and the remainder of fees were not included. Finally, respective fee schedules for each school are grouped together in Attachment 5.

Summary Remarks for Proposed Fees Above Board Parameters:

Although schools mostly adhered to the parameters for increasing school fees for the 2022-23 school year, the current external global economic conditions have made this difficult. The effects are not only felt on courses that require hard goods to be purchased such as lumber and steel, but also for those courses where services are provided by external third parties as they themselves are trying to keep up with inflationary pressures. Inflation has reached an 18-year high and there are many other factors from the pandemic we have yet to fully understand the scope of, for example supply chain issues continue to a factor. The largest fee increases are being seen in the areas of foods, construction, extracurricular athletics, and field trips.

For proposed fees that were above the 5% increase (including activity, extra-curricular and non-curricular travel), Financial Services reached out to the schools and reviewed their supporting documentation in order to determine whether the fee increases were reasonable. Many schools discussed their pricing for the fall of 2022 with their suppliers of goods and services. Most businesses expressed a foreseen increase in prices – such as admissions, officiating costs, tournament fees, facility rentals, etc., but did not want to give a specific dollar amount or percentage as they were not sure where things will be in September. Therefore, for many schools, market forecasts (discussed below) and comparisons to their school results (current year cost recovery or deficits) by program/course are reason enough to validate the need to increase some fees above the Board-provided parameters.

As additional support, course calculators were sent in for those requested, then reviewed, and validated, along with invoice comparisons from previous years to current prices.



At the beginning of the school year, the fees are revisited as some fees are decreased from the Board-approved amount due to factors such as change in programming. Fees for all extra-curricular activities are re-visited before the start of the season as things can change such as tournaments being cancelled or tournament fee increases. These are all unforeseen until the season is about to begin.

General Administrative/External Party Fees

Fees for things like officiating, and administration of such, have increased overall between 7-10% when comparing 2019 to 2021 invoices. For example, Edmonton Basketball Officials Association comparatives show a steady 7-10% increase year-over-year. In addition, officiating costs are going to be increases for 2022-23.

Increases are also seen across the board for admissions to venues such as learning centres, ski hills, and recreation centres. These associations/administrative services bodies charge for increasing general administrative costs and inflation but also for travel costs, if applicable. The number of tournament entries for athletics clubs/leagues are also a factor, many schools are seeing large increases in proposed fees given that more tournaments are being planned for in 2022-23, in turn resulting in higher costs; 1 additional tournament can result in up to a 20% - 50% increase in the fee. Given these increases, addition of tournament entries, and fuel - many schools have projected larger than 5% increases in athletics and field trips to align with EIPS' cost recovery practices.

Fuel/Transportation Costs

Since schools last set their fees in March 2021, the price of regular gasoline in Edmonton has risen by 41.3% according to GasBuddy, which tracks prices across Canada and the U.S.

Looking forward, average gasoline prices in Canada are expected to be \$1.31 USD/Liter (\$1.64 CDN) by the end of this quarter, according to Trading Economics global macro models and analysts' expectations. In the long-term, this increases \$1.42 USD/Liter (\$1.78) in 2023; some areas of Canada are already seeing increases greater than this as the conflict in Ukraine continues and the world shuts off Russian hydrocarbon products. These forecasted increases are evident in the proposed fees for school field trips in a large majority of the schools.

Food costs

According to the 12th edition of Canada's Food Price Report, forecasts are food prices will rise up to 7% in 2022, which is the biggest jump ever predicted by the annual report. This increase, in conjunction with the increase in fuel and transportation costs, are resulting in higher proposed fees for foods/culinary courses in 2022-23.

Lumber and construction materials

Many schools are proposing fee increases for Construction and Drama/Performing Arts well above 5% due to price increases for lumber and materials. These material and supply cost increases are evident and can be validated with consumer market research.

Continuing significant lumber sales volumes and ongoing constraints with supply, particularly in transportation, served to drive most construction framing dimension softwood lumber prices higher in the beginning of 2022. The most recent producer price index report revealed that prices for softwood lumber shot up 25.4% in the month of January 2022 alone. Prices of raw materials purchased by manufacturers operating in Canada, as



measured by the Raw Materials Price Index (RMPI), were up 6.5% on a monthly basis in January 2022 and up 30.5% year over year.

COMMUNICATION PLAN:

Once approved by the Board, schools will be notified of the approval and the fees will be posted on each school's website.

Establishing School Fees for 2022-23

Process and timelines

1. Parameters for setting fees (January)

Parameters are important as schools strive to improve/add to the value of education without impact to their budgets. The parameters help guide schools and protect parents. Parameters will be set by the Board in January.

2. Initial parent consultation (January)

Principals will hold an initial consultation with parents prior to setting, increasing, or decreasing fees. Questions and parent responses will assist schools in developing the fee schedule.

- 1) Email/contact all parents at least two weeks prior to the school council meeting to:
 - Indicate that school fees will be discussed (course fees, noon supervision, activity fees, and extra-curricular – including sports);
 - Provide parents with a current fee schedule (by attachment or link to the website);
 - Provide a list of questions for consideration; and
 - Supply a mechanism for obtaining parent feedback for those who are unable to attend the school council meeting.
- 2) Specifically, ask for input on the following:
 - Optional courses and associated fees
 - Noon supervision
 - Field trips and associated fees
 - Extracurricular activities
 - Non-curricular travel (for example, ski trips and band camps)
 - Non-curricular goods and services (for example, student union and yearbooks)

3. Fee submission template (February)

Financial Services will provide a template to schools for completing proposed fees for the new school year. Proposed fees will be established by using the parameters approved by the Board, principal discretion, parent feedback, and fee calculation tools.

4. Second parent meeting (March/April)

A second meeting with parents must be held to share proposed fees and the rationale for additions, increases, decreases, etc.

- 1) Email all parents at least two weeks prior to the school council meeting to indicate there will be a review of proposed school fees for 2022-23. The email will include the proposed fees.
- 2) After the meeting, the Principal and School Council Chair will sign a declaration affirming completion of all required steps. A checklist will be included on the declaration form.

- 5. Proposed fee schedules and declarations are due to Financial Services (March/April)
- 6. Financial Services will prepare school fee schedules for presentation to the Board (April)
- 7. The Board will review/approve proposed fees. If possible, timing will be such that they are not presented in the same month as the Spring Budget is presented. (May)

8. Course Registration

As registration occurs prior to the approval of fees, the proposed feeschedule, as presented at the second parent council meeting, or prior year's fees, will accompany registration forms (or course handbooks) as "estimated" fees for the 2022-23 school year and subject to Board approval. Communication must be made by email to all parents with the list of proposed fees.

9. Extra-curricular/Sports teams

Before a student can try out for a team, parents must be made aware of both the financial and time obligations for participation. Prior to tryouts, schools will email parents of students signed up for tryouts outlining the fee, practice and game schedules, responsibilities of team members, and other relevant information.

10. Fee additions/changes

The Board recognizes that, during the school year, flexibility is needed to make fee additions or changes for missed fees or new opportunities. These will be subject to approval by the Superintendent and Secretary-Treasurer. Two reports will be presented to the Board at Caucus meetings in January and June with any approved changes.

11. Tracking

Schools are required to individually track costs related to fees for courses, activities/field trips, and other revenue to ensure details on fees and offsetting costs are readily available.

EIPS PRIORITY: Enhance public education through effective engagement, partnerships, and

EIPS GOAL: Supports and services for students and families.

EIPS OUTCOME: Community partnerships support the needs of our students.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the Board of Trustees approve the Facility Rental and Lease Fees for the 2022-23 school year.

BACKGROUND:

Policy 2: Role of the Board, Section 8.11 Fiscal Accountability establishes that the Board of Trustees will annually approve various administrative fees, including the leasing and rental fees.

Leasing of school facilities shall be considered on the basis of functional compatibility, space availability, land use compliance, and financial impact. The Division believes that after Division requirements have been met, the community shall have a reasonable access to Division facilities (AP546). Offering surplus space to before and after school care programs supports the families of EIPS' students by having consistent and safe care for their children. Preschool programming provides opportunities for future students to reach social, intellectual, and physical developmental milestones, imperative for kindergarten and grade 1 readiness.

Supporting communities, students, and families to engage in activities to promote healthy lifestyles continues to be a high priority for the Division. The use of gymnasiums and other division space will be offered to the community at rates based on actual cost recovery of costs incurred by the Division.



RECOMMENDATION REPORT

Operating Costs:

Overall, operating costs have increased over prior year and are continuing to increase. The largest increases relate to: property insurance premiums, electricity and natural gas, carbon tax, custodial cleaning and supplies, and rising cost of goods. These increases, coupled with economic factors such as supply chain issues and inflation, means EIPS has a higher threshold to maintain cost recovery. It is likely that the cost of running our schools will continue to increase next year.

Rental Fees:

The Division's largest joint use agreement is with Strathcona County, which stipulates that bookings requested by the community are free-of-charge. As such, Elk Island Public Schools currently loses money on community use rentals. In order to recover those lost revenues, EIPS needs to increase our rental rates to manage this shortfall and the increasing operating costs. The largest proposed rate increase is youth activities on weekends for tier 1 and tier 2 gyms (a 48% and 42% increase respectively). At the newly proposed rates for this group, EIPS remains 33 - 60% lower than our neighbors in our community, and up to 100% lower than our neighbors outside the Division's geographical area. EIPS is currently a low cost provider of reactional spaces compared to the going rates of the school boards around EIPS. The proposed increased rates are justified and remain far below our neighbors. The increase is required to maintain the facility rentals program.

Lease Rates:

As per AP 546, lease rates for non-profit organizations shall, at minimum, be on a cost-recovery basis. Lease rates for for-profit organizations shall, at minimum, be set at a reasonable rate of return. EIPS proposes to increase its lease rates by 10% for the following year to manage rising operational costs. At the proposed rates, non-profits rates are set at cost recovery and for-profit rates just below market average. EIPS will remain a below-average cost provider of lease space, which is pertinent to our communities.

COMMUNICATION PLAN:

Following approval by the Board on April 21, 2022, the rental rates will be updated on the EIPS website and communicated to the Leadership Group. All after hours facility rental user groups, daycares, and before and after school care groups will then be notified of the approved rate changes via email.

In 2018-19, EIPS established a fee schedule for students who require specialized supports and services in both inclusive settings and system programs.

EIPS may enter into service agreements with a resident school division for non-resident students who require specialized supports and services beyond what the basic grant provides. If a service agreement is declined, the student must return to the resident board. The fees outline the parameters for a potential service agreement should one be considered in situations where a student is a non-resident of the Division. The fees vary program by program, and student by student, as the cost of providing educational programming for programs and students varies. To inform the fee amounts, average year over year costs for programming in both system programs and inclusive settings have been considered. An increase of 1% is proposed to align with an anticipated 1% increase in the province's per student funding for the 2022-23 school year. Attached is the fee schedule to guide the development of service agreements. These calculations are based on typical resources required to support students with special needs.

BACKGROUND:

Policy 2, Role of the Board, section 8.11 Fiscal Accountability establishes that the Board of Trustees will approve administrative fees annually, including the P4S fees. P4S continues to be excellent stewards of the money provided to operate the P4S program. For the 2022-23 school year we are anticipating that we will require more monetary resources, due to increasing costs of supplies and materials (current inflation is 5.1%), to operate in a similar manner in 2022-2023.

Historically, Elk Island Catholic Schools (EICS) have been invoiced for their portion of EIPS expenses related to supplies and the staffing of the two positions directly in the P4S distribution center. Staffing costs related to administration of the program (EIPS Director, Administrative Assistant & Business Manager Support) as well as the cost of operating the distribution center (utilities) have been covered by EIPS.

Administration of the program includes supervision of the Partners for Science staff, applying for grants with DOW, creation of a MOU with DOW, implementation of the deliverables of the MOU, reviewing and approving all purchases, and budgeting. Between the three positions, this is estimated to cost EIPS approximately \$15,000 per year (0.05 FTE of the three positions). Utility costs for the distribution center, including electrical, natural gas and water/sewer were estimated to be \$2207.46 in 2019-2020 and \$2370.70 in 2020-21. With the rising costs of electricity and natural gas we are anticipating a cost of \$2714.21 – a 7% increase per year.



For the 2021-22 school year, EICS reported 4130 students and EIPS has 11837 students in grades 1-9. EICS has 35% of the student population that EIPS has. To offset the cost of the \$15,000 administration and \$2714.21 utility costs (Total \$17714.21) we are proposing that EICS cover the 35% cost for their students (\$6200).

The attached fee schedule reflects an increase for both elementary (13.75%) and junior high (13.75%) P4S programs to cover the cost of inflation, and portion of administrative and operating costs.

Estimated total fees charged to Elk Island Catholic Schools for P4S Kits for the 2022-23 school year are based on 2021-22 enrolment. A \$26.25 restocking charge (increase of 5% due to inflation) will be used for the 2022-23 school year as a means to minimize kits that are returned late, as this negatively impacts programming for the next receiving school.

For the 2021-22 school year, one half-year student and one full-year international student are in attendance. There are no Alberta non-resident students registered with EIPS in 2021-22.

Given that EIPS' resources are not infinite, the following fee schedule would provide the Division with an option for this very specific, and likely rare, situation.

On occasion, EIPS is asked to provide PALS programming for a typically developing twin of a student with a diagnostic profile that would qualify them for Program Unit Funding. This occurred in one situation for the 2021-22 school year at Ardrossan Elementary.

Providing programming for the typically developing twin, along with their sibling, is beneficial for both children and potentially beneficial for the PALS program. Families benefit by being able to share and practice the knowledge, skills and attributes learned in PALS with both twins. Repetition and reinforcement play critical roles in early childhood development and success. PALS programs also benefit by having another peer model of speech, language and social interaction within the classroom.

An increase of 1% is proposed to align with an anticipated 1% increase in the province's per student funding for the 2022-23 school year.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the Board of Trustees approve the Student Transportation Fee Schedule for the 2022-23 school year, as presented.

BACKGROUND:

Policy 2, Role of the Board, Section 8.11 Fiscal Accountability establishes that the Board of Trustees will approve various administrative fees annually, including the student transportation fees.

Alberta Education provides transportation funding based on the following criteria:

- Students attending their designated school and residing greater than 2.39 km to the school; or
- Students attending a non-designated school and residing greater than 2.39 km to both their designated school and the school they are attending.

Elk Island Public Schools (EIPS) Student Transportation provides an enhanced busing service to students that exceeds the mandated service as outlined by Alberta Education. This enhanced service provides provisions for:

- Students attending a non-designated school,
- Students attending a designated school and residing less than 2.4 km from the school; or
- Students requiring transportation to an address other than their home address.



Charging fees acts as a method for cost recovery to offset the funding shortfall of the incremental costs of providing transportation services as set forth in Student Transportation Policy 17. School Transportation Regulation AR96/2019 Section 7(4) reads:

"Any surplus from transportation fees charged under subsection (1) or (2) must be used to subsidize
the cost of transportation of students referred to in that subsection in the two school years following
the school year in which the surplus was collected."

School Transportation Regulation AR96/2019 Section 8 sets forth the requirements of a board to establish, maintain and implement policies respecting the transportation of students, the fees it proposes to charge and a fee waiver process. Section 9 and 10 reference the requirement to establish a fee schedule of transportation fees, listing each type of transportation fee, with its amount, that may be charged in that school year.

For the 2022-23 school year transportation funding will be calculated using the 2021-22 grant funding rather than filling out the grant application. This funding method is being used in the interim while the minister's office reviews the results of the Transportation Task Force and enacts an updated funding model for the 2023-24 school year. Further, during the budget announcement on February 24, 2022, an increase of 4.6% to the 2022-23 Student Transportation budget is being applied to offset increased costs for MELT, fuel, labor (for Bus Drivers and repairs), parts, and the cost of buses. At the time of the budget announcement, fuel was at \$1.33/litre, since then diesel fuel has increased to \$1.74/litre. It is important to note that the increased costs to fuel alone will not be offset with the funding increase of 4.6%.

To ensure consistent transportation service levels to EIPS families are maintained, Student Transportation has absorbed significant increased costs to cover the delivery of the legislated MELT program as well as increased costs to fuel and insurance (since 19/20 over 100% increase). This balance has been maintained without substantial hardship to families although it has not taken into consideration other inflationary costs faced by EIPS School Bus Contractors and recognized by the government when outlining their rationale for the 4.6% increase.

CONSIDERATION AND ANALYSIS:

The following factors were taken into consideration in the analysis and subsequent recommendation for the 2022-23 Fee Schedule:

- An analysis of the revenue vs. expenditures of the Student Transportation budget both current year and 2022-23.
- An estimate of anticipated ridership for the 2022-23 school year based on the February 2022 returning student registration busing requests.
- An increase to school bus contractors to offset inflationary costs.
- Route optimization to find efficiencies where feasible.
- Diesel fuel calculated at \$2.00/litre adjusting for inflation.
- Rural student funding on average is not sufficient to cover the cost to transport students when considering density.
- The expenditure increase to the 2022-23 budget includes costs associated with fuel and student ridership taken at a snapshot in time. It is recognized that these costs are volatile in nature and any change to these factors can have a significant impact to the budget.



Transportation fees are broken down into two categories, Eligible and Ineligible. Below, are the definitions that guide the fee assessment.

Eligible (this category of students are funded)

 Students that attend their designated school and reside greater than 2.39 km from their designated school.

Ineligible (this category includes three groups of students, one group funded and two non-funded)

- Students that attending their designated school and reside less than 2.4 km from their designated school.
 These students are not funded, and we are not mandated to provide transportation for this group of students. They fall under the enhanced service provision provided by EIPS.
- Students that are attending a non-designated/school of choice and reside greater than 2.39 km away
 from both their designated and school of attendance. These students are funded by Alberta Education,
 but we are not mandated to provide transportation to. They fall under the enhanced service provision
 provided by EIPS.
- 3. Students that are attending a non-designated school/school of choice and reside less than 2.4 km away from either, their non-designated or school of attendance. These students are not funded by Alberta Education, and we are not mandated to provide transportation for this group of students. They fall under the enhanced service provision provided by EIPS.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

That the Board of Trustees approve a budget reallocation of unanticipated surplus of \$110,000 to support an enhanced kindergarten initiative.

That the Board of Trustees approve a budget reallocation of unanticipated surplus of \$184,000 for renovations to Pine Street Elementary for the Connections program.

That the Board of Trustees approve a budget reallocation of unanticipated surplus of \$400,000 to schools for various opportunities they can identify at their schools.

BACKGROUND:

A review of financial operations has determined the following surplus available for redistribution. This is surplus in excess of projections.

These amounts represent surplus that typically transfers into Division Unallocated Reserves at the end of the year. Due to the limit on operating reserves, administration will bring a request to the Board in August 2022 to transfer more funds into capital reserves to keep our operating reserves below the operating reserve limit for Aug. 31, 2023. Reallocating some of these dollars now allows us to spend down our dollars in the year we receive it and for more projects to be completed earlier.

Administration also has looked at what it is holding for illness and currently feel that amount is adequate. The outcomes from the sixth wave will not be known for at least another month.

Projects to Allocate Dollars from Current Year Surplus – Total is \$694,000

1. Enhanced Kindergarten \$110,000

Recognizing the importance of giving kindergarten students a stronger start to grade 1, the Division is offering enhanced kindergarten at some school sites. Enhanced kindergarten is full-day everyday kindergarten – this exceeds the two to three days per week currently provided. There are currently four schools that will be offering full day kindergarten (Andrew School, Lamont Elementary, Bruderheim School and Mundare School) for the remainder of the year. A.L. Horton and Ardrossan Elementary will also be doing some targeted supports. All schools were offered to reach out for enhanced kindergarten funds.

2. Pine Street Elementary renovations \$184,000

Supports for Students has completed a needs analysis at Pine Street School for both the PALS and Connections Programs. The work involves adding a quiet room (for voluntary student regulation breaks), and renovation to two existing washrooms to make them more accessible. A "quiet room" is a space in a classroom that students may voluntarily use for short periods of time to take a break; the quiet room has tools available for students related to sensory needs, preferred activities that students enjoy, and self-regulation

3. Allocation out to schools \$400,000 maximum

Although late in the year, there are opportunities for schools to use the additional dollars for student achievement or other school related purposes (supplies and materials, SGF shortfalls). An allocation has been established based on school size groupings (number of students per from Grades 2 to 12). [Schools were recently given allocations for Learning Disruption Funding for grade 1, additional supports for kindergarten and hence why enrolment in grades 2-12 were used]. Schools with students in the "up to 300" in enrolment will receive \$11,000 each, schools with students from "300-595 in enrolment" will receive \$11,600 each and schools with enrolment over 595 will receive \$8,300 each. Schools will be given the above parameters with direction it must be spent by August 31.

COMMUNICATION:

Once the Board approves the adjustments, administration will communicate information to various stakeholders and make necessary budget adjustments.
